London Whip-Women Obligated to Abandon Ancient Concession

LONDON (AP)—The whip-women of Covent Garden are going to abandon the premises of this famous produce market for the same reason that the village blacksmith is becoming an automobile salesman. The whip-women are among the picturesque denizens that go along with this most picturesque market square, and for the last 300 years an unbroken line of members of their families has checked the whips of the produce growers who frequent this market.
This concession of whip checking, which has supported many families for so long a time, was granted to six ancestors of the present-day whip-women in the sixteenth century when 'Coven Garden' was really a convent garden of the Monks of Westminster, outside which the farmers brought their garden truck to sell. In that century half a dozen whip-women took charge of the whips of the farmers to keep them from the hands of thieves, and collected a penny from the owner at the end of the day. The number of whip-women has grown to 12 because some women left their share of the concession to two daughters, but even though the price of checking whips is now three pence, the whip women of today cannot make a living, they say.
The women decided recently to ask the authorities to grant them the right to ask six pence for their custodianship, but the authorities refused. At a meeting they decided to let the whip thieves have the upper hand.
Shortly the familiar figures of the whip-women will disappear from Covent Garden just as the horse and the street cries have disappeared, and in their place will be several bobbies who are to be assigned to look after the safety of the whips.

HORSES STARVE TO DEATH

EUGENE, Ore.—Eleven horses owned by John R. Chezam, a farmer living on the Lorane highway, five miles southwest of Eugene, were allowed to starve to death during the past few days, according to a complaint filed. Chezam was arrested on a charge of cruelty to animals. He pleaded not guilty and will be tried later.
Melvin Turnbull, traffic officer and special deputy sheriff, who made the arrest, said that seven or eight other horses on the place likely would die unless fed soon.
Chezam said he ran out of hay and turned his animals out to care for themselves. The grass supply was shut off with the advent of the recent freezing weather.

Income Tax Facts

No. 14
The revenue act of 1924 provides that in computing net income there may be deducted gross income "a reasonable allowance for the exhaustion, wear, and tear of property used in trade or business, including a reasonable allowance for obsolescence." For convenience this allowance is usually referred to as "depreciation." Its deduction is confined to property actually used in a business, trade, profession, or vocation. In general it applies to capital assets, the cost of which can not be deducted as an expense. For example, a lawyer or physician is not permitted to write off as a current expense the cost of this professional library, but may deduct an allowance for its depreciation.
Deductions are not allowed for depreciation of a taxpayer's home, the furnishings therein, his personal effects or clothing. Costings used exclusively in the theoretical business, however, may be the subject of a depreciation allowance.
Depreciation in the value of land, whether improved or unimproved, can not be claimed.
No amount may be included for depreciation representing reduction in value of property due to changes in environment—for example, loss in rental due to change in the social or business condition of the neighborhood. Neither is any change in the amount or rate of depreciation allowable on account of an increase or decrease in the market value of property. Fluctuation in the value of depreciable property has no bearing upon the rate or amount allowable for depreciation.
Intangibles, the use of which in trade or business is definitely limited in duration may be the subject of a depreciation allowance. Examples are patents, copyrights, licenses, and franchises.
