

PENDLETON BEATS TIGERS 28-15

BUCKS PROVE TO MUCH FOR LOCAL CAGERS

PENDLETON, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—The Pendleton Buckaroos won from La Grande high school's basketball team last night 28 to 15 in a second game.

Game Fast One of the fastest and most interesting basketball games played yet this year by the La Grande team was won last evening by and at Pendleton. The score was 28 to 15 in favor of Pendleton but as often the case the score is no true indication of the relative merits of the two teams.

The game was fast from start to finish with each side making many fast plays most of which were blocked before scoring. The tendency of the La Grande team to blow up just when the ball was in its own territory was very apparent last evening. Time and again Hummelt, Upmuno and Glass carried the ball down the floor to within scoring distance and then fumbled the ball, passed to the opposition or in some other way lost the chance to score.

Equal in Floorwork In playing the floor the two teams were about equal with the Buckaroos playing more consistent ball and taking advantage of their opportunities to score more consistently than the Blue and White quintet. The long shots from little past the middle of the floor were repeatedly used by the Pendleton team and the La Grande outfit unused to playing in a gym with a high ceiling had difficulty in blocking such a long distance from the basket.

Landrum, former La Grande boy who played for the Eugene team in the state tournament last year was the real star of the game playing guard for Pendleton in place of Hatten who was out with a sore throat. Landrum scored four field goals most of which were long shots.

Hummelt High Point Man For La Grande Hummelt and Upmuno played the best games. Hummelt made four of the seven baskets made by the Tigers and was one of the main factors in the defense.

MacTavish, La Grande coach expressed the opinion this morning that the team's showing had been very encouraging in spite of the unfavorable score. The La Grande team is looking principally at the present time in the drive to score the baskets after bringing the ball all the way from the end of the floor.

The games tonight will be played with the Union teams. The girls' game will precede the boys' contest and will start at 8 o'clock.

BAN FAVORED BY COOLIDGE

WASHINGTON (AP)—The dispute between organization Republicans and La Follette insurgents broke out afresh Friday in the house. Representative Longworth, the Republican leader, stirring up another round of debate by declaring the Wisconsin delegation, by its activity in the recent campaign, had forfeited the right to participate in party caucuses.

About the same time it was made clear at the White House that the decision of the Republican leaders in the house to exclude from the party organization caucus, February 27, members who did not support the national ticket in November had the approval of President Coolidge.

The president's view of the situation is that it does not involve exclusion of any member from the party but is a question of limiting party responsibility to those who, in the campaign, united to pledge the Republican party to the accomplishment of definite purposes. An honest attempt to carry out these pledges, he holds, makes necessary the inclusion within the party organization of only those pledged to such an accomplishment.

Disclaiming an intention to "publishing" the dozen followers of La Follette who are to be barred from the party's organization caucus February 27, Mr. Longworth said it was the duty of house Republicans to carry out the mandate of the people in the last election "unimpeded by evasions."

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul light heavyweight, has accepted an offer of \$25,000 for a 16-round bout here with Tony Puente, Mexican heavyweight, provided Puente is cleared of a charge of violating the California anti-prize fight law in a bout at Culver City recently. It was announced by Dick Donald, promoter.

Puente has not yet been approached in the matter, Donald preferring to await the outcome of the Culver City case.

In the Culver City bout Puente stretched Fred Fulton of Signeapolis upon the canvas in 25 seconds of fighting, but the fans yelled "fake" and Puente, Fulton and their managers were arrested.
