Stamp Collectors Swamped
 With New and Varied Issues
 LEIPSIK, (AP)—There are now 42,000 different varieties of postage stamps extant in the world, of which 22,000 are credited to Europe and 40,000 to the other continents, according to the publishers of one of the best known stamp catalogs of Germany. Within the past two years 4,000 new stamps were issued by the various governments of the world.

This enormous increase in postage stamp production has made collectors despair of ever obtaining anything like a complete collection of existing stamps, and the special collection has given place to the general collection.

Before the inflation period one saw many rare old American stamps in German dealer's windows. These have now disappeared almost entirely for American dealers and stamp collecting visitors bought them when the German mark was cheap.

Pennsylvania Cow Crowned With Butter-Fat Honors
 CHICAGO (AP)—After breaking the world's record for the production of butterfat in ten months as a junior three-year-old a little more than a year ago, Lyons Sarcenic Kornykye, a pure-bred Holstein-Friesian cow, has just completed a ten-month test with a butter-fat record which makes her the world's leading junior four-year-old over all breeds. Her 305-day record was 24,052.3 pounds milk and 854.88 pounds butter-fat (1.065,6 pounds butter).

The new champion is on the farm of Abner S. Deysher, near Reading, Pa. A ration consisting of home-mixed grains, including oil meal, coconut meal, molasses and beet pulp, with considerable quantities of good corn silage and alfalfa hay, was fed.

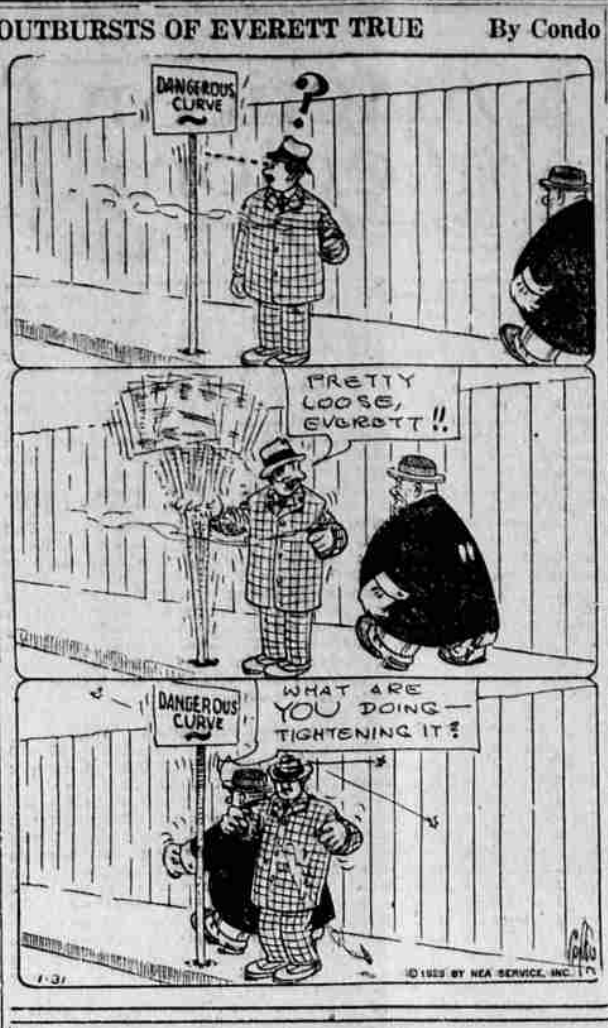

Farm Conference Closes

OREGON CITY, Ore. — The Clatsop county agricultural economists conference closed here recently after a two-day session. More than 250 farmers and specialists in agriculture heard reports of the eight committees which had been working in conjunction with Oregon Agricultural college farm extension specialists in determining the best crops for Clatsop county and figuring the amount to grow for the available markets.

Income Tax Facts

No. 15

The basis for computing the amount deductible on account of depreciation and obsolescence upon property acquired after February 28, 1913, in general, is the cost of such property. In the case of property acquired before March 1, 1913, the basis is the cost of the property, or its fair market value as of that date, whichever is greater. To compute the amount of depreciation which may be claimed, the tax payer should determine the probable life of the property, then divide by the number of years it will be useful in the business in which employed. The result thus obtained will represent the amount which may be claimed as a deduction. For example, a frame building, the probable lifetime of which is 25 years, cost \$10,000. Divide \$10,000 by 25 and claim \$400 each year as deduction.

If a taxpayer claims the full amount of depreciation he can not claim as a deduction the cost of repairs to the property during the same year. "Repairs" in this connection means repairs in the nature of replacements to the extent that they arrest deterioration, such as a new flooring or roof.

When in the course of years, the owner of the property has claimed its full cost, no further claim for depreciation will be allowed.

Deductions for depreciations must be made as a separate item of the taxpayer's return, and must be explained by showing separately each of property, its cost, estimated life, depreciation charged off for the taxable year and total depreciation charged off for all taxable years.
