EVOLVE NOVELTY HAND BAG

PARIS (AP)—The "Velvet Pochette" is the latest fashion in bags which the Paris creative genius, always on the alert in imagining charming new fancies to tempt the fashionable woman's fancy, has invented.

They are mostly made in old-rose velvet, brightened by a formal design of steel paillettes and are to be had in all the colors of the rainbow. Small in size—about half the usual size of women's hand bags—they are just now enjoying a tremendous vogue in Paris.

A flowered bag in nigger-brown silk, ornamented with a bouquet embroidered in gold thread cut out on a yellow silk background, small enough to be put in the pockets of the wearer's great-coats, was very much in evidence at the Autel racetrack recently when the thermometer was hovering around zero and fingers became numb with cold. Rites and Practices Of Sect Are Aired in Courts

OAKLAND, Cal. (NEA Special)—Southern California is keeping a weather eye on a local cult predicting the end of the world February 6.

But Northern California, still battling up to form in the rivalry for publicity, isn't caught napping.

And Alameda county presents today, "Hickory Hall."

Through the courts come stories of a weird religious cult, of charges that children were whipped with ropes; of virtual slavery to a priestess; of involuntary confinement and the like, with a trimming of blackjacks, a shrine, and metaphysical mystery.

It started when Mrs. Hilka Conklin, ex-mistress of the cult, filed habeas corpus proceedings to secure the release of Valoyce Conklin, her 4-year-old ward. The child was withheld by Mrs. Joyce Leech, high priestess, the mother charged.

Then came her stories of stern treatment of children for minor infractions, of being compelled to eat children with a rope, and of other women carrying the punishment further when she desisted, sick at heart.

From the high priestess comes denial of cruelty. Instead of weird rites, she declares that Hickory Hall, rented by a group of women from San Diego, held services in conformity with an orthodox creed; and that Mrs. Conklin, herself, was cruel to children.

The case is still in court—and neighbors, scandal lovers and juvenile authorities are watching the proceedings very closely.

Safety Council Honors Railroads' Benefactor

CHICAGO (AP)—A movement to immortalize the name of Lorenzo A. Coffin, credited with being the sponsor of the first safety appliance act adopted by congress and godfather of the air brake and the automatic coupler, has been started by the steam railroad section of the National Safety Council. The memorial may be in the form of a monument to be placed in the national capital.
