

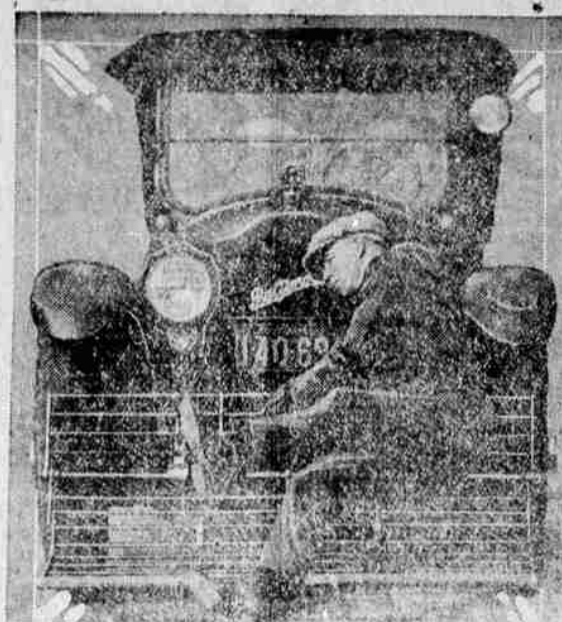

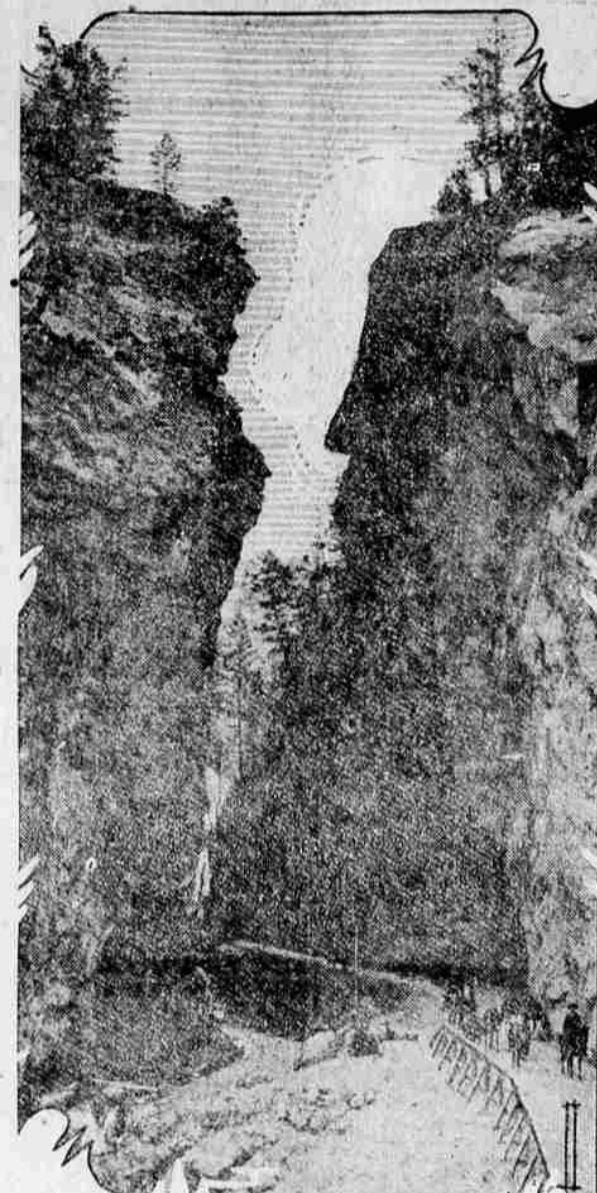

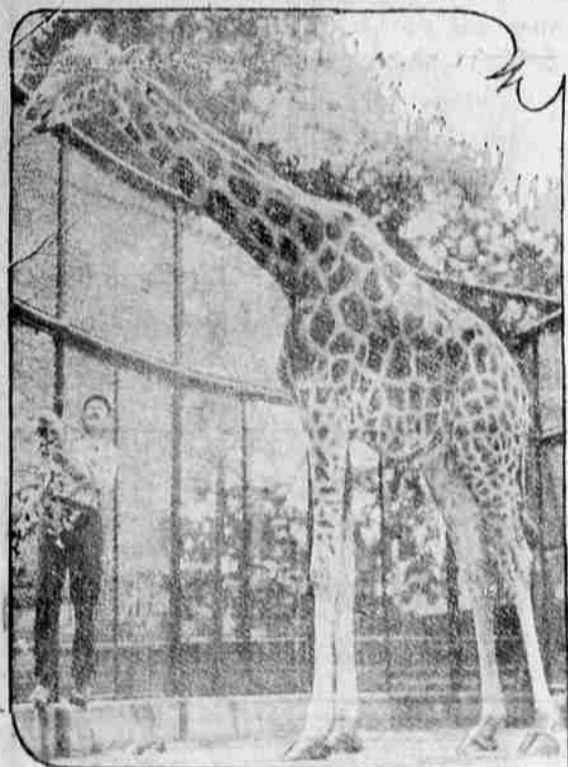

A very popular highway, this Banff-Lake Windermere trail through the Canadian Pacific Rockies. There are hundreds of miles of scenes like this.



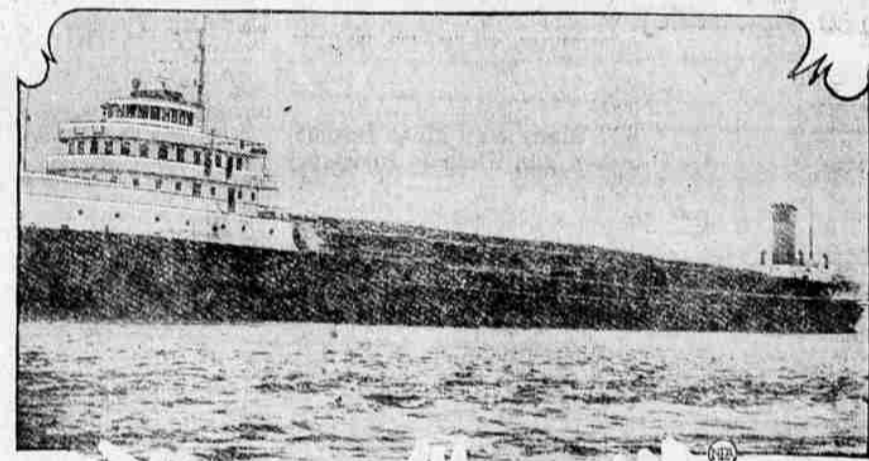
