MANY AMERICANS HAVE JOBS NOW IN PHILIPPINES

MANILA (AP)—Five hundred and sixty-two Americans were employed in the Philippine civil service at the end of the present fiscal year, as against 504 at the same time last year, according to figures made public by the civil service bureau. The Americans were distributed as follows:

Office of the governor general, 12; bureau of audits, one; executive bureau, one; Philippine constabulary, 21; metropolitan district, two; bureau of education, 343; Philippine health service, 11; bureau of customs, three; bureau of internal revenue, four; bureau of the treasury, two; bureau of printing, one; Philippine library and museum, one; bureau of prisons, seven; bureau of agriculture, nine; bureau of forestry, seven; bureau of science, 11; weather bureau, one; bureau of public works, 26; bureau of posts, four; coast and geodetic survey, three; supreme court, six; courts of first instance, four; justices of the peace, two; provincial service, 19; Manila fire department, 13; Manila police department, 43; Manila department of engineering and public works, eight; and municipal service of the city of Baguio, three. The Filipinos in the service during 1923 numbered 14,053. They received salaries for the year amounting to \$8,623,000, while the 562 Americans received \$1,183,000.

Income Tax Facts

No. 16. The revenue act of 1924 provides that losses not compensated for by insurance or otherwise are deductible if incurred in trade or business, in any transaction entered into for profit though not connected with the taxpayer's trade or business or if arising from "fires, storms, shipwreck, or other casualty or from theft."

Losses connected with the purchase and sale of merchandise are ascertained by means of inventories, which are required whenever in the opinion of the commissioner of Internal Revenue their use is necessary in order clearly to determine the income of any taxpayer.

A manufacturer may be compelled to scrap machinery because it has become obsolete. He may deduct the loss sustained if he has sold or otherwise permanently abandoned the old machinery. If a taxpayer demolishes a building used in his trade or business and replaces it, he may deduct the loss sustained. But if he acquires the site of a new building, land upon which is located an old building, demolition of the old building is not considered a loss, therefore not deductible.

Losses connected with transactions "entered into for profit" not connected with the taxpayer's trade or business must conform closely to the wording of the statute to be allowed. For example a lawyer may purchase an apartment with the object of deriving income from the rental. A physician buys shares of stock on which he hopes to make a profit. Both sustain losses upon a subsequent sale which are deductible. But if either should sell his residence, which at the time of purchase was bought without the intention of resale, the loss, if any, is not deductible, because it was not a transaction "entered into for profit." Similarly, a loss connected with the sale of an automobile bought for pleasure or convenience of the taxpayer can not be deducted.
