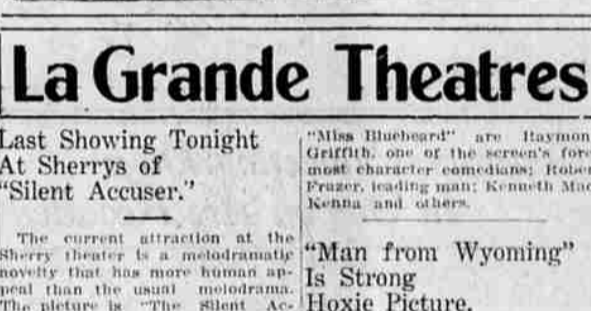
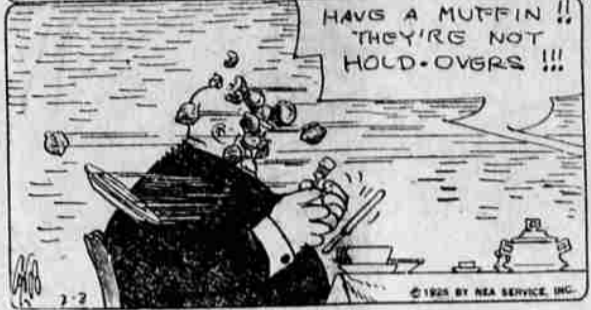

Last Showing Tonight At Sherrys of "Silent Accuser."

The current attraction at the Sherry theater is a melodramatic novelty that has more human appeal than the usual melodrama. The picture is "The Silent Accuser," produced and directed by Chester M. Franklin and released by Metro-Goldwyn.

It is an innovation in screen entertainment in that it makes use of a situation never done before. A highly intelligent police dog, Peter the Great, is the only witness of the murder of the heroine's stepfather. Through the dog's almost human instinct, the hero escapes from prison after he has been accused falsely of the crime. Subsequently, in a story filled with adventure, romance, intrigue and thrills, the dog and the heroine, who dresses as a boy, assist the hero in catching the real criminal. The story was written by Jack Boyle and adapted to the screen by Mr. Franklin and Frank O'Connor, the assistant director.

The title role of "The Silent Accuser" is played by Peter the Great, who is making his screen debut, and who thus leaps into immediate popularity. A large cast is headed by Eleanor Boardman, Raymond McKee and Karl Metcalfe. Charles Dreyer is responsible for the beautiful photography. Cedric Gibbons designed the sets; and Lloyd Nosler was film editor. Sophie Wachner made the costumes.

Bebe Scores Hit As Comedienne in "Miss Bluebeard."

Bebe Daniels comes to the Arcade theater Tuesday next as the star of the Paramount picture, "Miss Bluebeard," directed by Frank Tuttle—a picture of the Broadway stage play, "Little Miss Bluebeard," by Avery Hopwood.

The screen play, by Townsend Martin, deals with a series of matrimonial adventures and gives Miss Daniels a fine opportunity to display her talents as a comedienne. Bebe's role in the picture is one of a French actress. She goes to London on a holiday and, through a series of most amusing incidents en route, she arrives there the wife of two men.

This piquant situation and the complications that follow are said to provide the volatile Bebe with an excellent opportunity for her comedy talents. The fun, while at all times clean and wholesome, is declared to be practically continuous. The stage play made from the same story, in which Irene Bordoni starred, scored a big success on Broadway and on the road, angling well for the picture.

ly known only to buffalo and cattle, is woven into the Universal picture starring Jack Hoxie, which plays at the Star theater, titled "The Man from Wyoming."

It is the story of the feuds of the cattlemen and sheep men, feuds which have echoed across the western plains with the same dull menace which characterizes the feuds of Kentucky mountaineers. The story doesn't generalize, however, but takes a specific instance of a sheep man who deliberately tries to steal a cattlemen's range and presents pictorially the trouble which the incident aroused.

The sympathy has been fairly evenly divided between the sheep and the cattle, although a lonely sheepherder, who is tied by circumstances to a job he detests, bears the brunt of the grief—and the loss of the afternoon, when the feud is ended. He wins the heart and hand of the girl who has been his natural enemy, the proprietor of the cattle ranch.

The picture is a version of William MacLeod Raine's popular novel, "Wyoming," and is a graphic presentation of action aroused by the bitterness among cattlemen of the western country at the invasion of the open range by the sheepmen, whose "woolies" ate the grass to the roots.

Hoxie portrays the role of a cowboy, wrongfully sent to prison, who, escaping, is protected by a ruthless land crook who is running a big head of sheep upon government range, which has long been the grazing ground for a big cattle outfit. The crook wishes to succeed in becoming a sheep lord and gets into trouble immediately when the cowboys try to drive him off the range.

Isadore Bernstein adapted the story from the novel, and Robert North Bradbury, director of such prize-winning Hoxie pictures as "The Red Warning," handled the cinematography.

Hoxie does excellent work in the role of sheepman and there is plenty of fast action to suit the audience. Lillian Rich is pretty and capable as the little owner of the big cattle ranch and Claude Payton makes one hate him as the owner of the sheep which Hoxie herds. As a land shark, he tries every means of winning the girl and securing her ranch. The rest of the cast is entirely adequate. Photographically, the picture is beautiful.

Income Tax Facts

No. 17.

The revenue act of 1924 provides that the basis for determining taxable gain or deductible loss from the sale or other disposition of property acquired after February 28, 1922—the first income tax law became effective March 1, 1913—shall be the cost of such property with certain exceptions.

The first is that if the property should have been included in the taxpayer's last inventory, the basis shall be the last inventory value thereof. For example, if a merchant in 1923 bought a certain article, and it was not sold by him prior to December 31, 1923, but was included in his inventory as of that date, the taxable gain or deductible loss would be the difference between the selling price and the amount at which the article was carried in the inventory.

If the property was acquired by gift after December 31, 1920, the basis shall be the same as it would be in the hands of the donor or last preceding owner by whom it was not acquired by gift. For example, a man in 1921 bought stock in a corporation at \$100 a share, kept it until January, 1922, when it was worth \$120 and then gave it to his son who in 1923 transferred it to his wife, the stock then being worth \$150 a share. If in 1924 the wife sold the stock for \$200 a share, her taxable profit is not \$50 but \$100 a share, the gain over the cost to the last preceding owner who did not acquire the stock by gift.

In computing the gain or loss from the sale or other disposition of property acquired by gift or transfer in trust on or before December 31, 1920, or by bequest, devise, or inheritance, the basis shall be the fair market price or value of such property at the time of acquisition. For example, a taxpayer received in 1919 a gift of real estate having a fair market value of \$10,000, which he sold in 1924 for \$15,000. The original cost to the donor in 1914 was \$12,000. The taxable gain, however, is \$5,000.
