Comedian in "Miss Bluebeard."

Perhaps nothing worse can befall an actor on the legitimate stage than the loss of his voice. When such a misfortune comes to an actor whose family for five generations has been identified with the stage it would seem that Fate could not deal a harder blow.

Raymond Griffith, playing opposite Bebe Daniels in her latest Paramount picture, "Miss Bluebeard," coming to the Arcade today, was the victim of such a mishap a few years ago. The son of an actor, Griffith was practically born into the theatre. It was while he was playing the boy in "The Wishing Door," during the performance of which Griffith was obliged to shriek every night and at two matinees each week, that he suddenly found himself without a voice. He felt no pain, nor was there any other ailment, except that when he tried to speak, no sound issued from his throat. Doctors explained that one of his vocal cords had become so strained by the exaggerated demand he made on their ability that it could never regain its normal position. Today he can talk easily enough, but not above a whisper.

Suddenly robbed of a means of livelihood, and with his career shattered, Griffith was like a ship without a rudder until the great misfortune of the seven became apparent.
