 HOLLYWOOD, Cal. (AP)—The motion picture studio lure, which annually entices to Hollywood thousands of persons of all ages, each pursuing hope of a screen career, is not confined to the United States, but has spread to other parts of the world, according to James McPherson, chief inspector of the Ellis Island immigration station in New York. He has been visiting here.

Two questions, "How far is it to Hollywood?" and "How can I get into the movies?" are asked constantly by immigrants entering the United States through Ellis Island, McPherson said.

"Whether they come from Poland, Italy, Germany or France, they seem to have heard of the wealth and fame earned by those who have succeeded in the picture producing business."

Positive Cure for Diabetes Sought by Purifying Insulin

PASADENA, Cal. (AP)—A positive cure for diabetes through elimination of impurities in so-called pure insulin, is being sought here at the California Institute of Technology by Dr. John J. Abel, professor of pharmacology and physiological chemistry of Johns Hopkins University.

For some time physicians and scientists have been administering insulin believing it to be pure, said Dr. Abel. Recently he found that even the purest contained foreign material. He then obtained large quantities and came here to continue his search for means of eliminating these impurities.

If it is possible to obtain insulin in an absolutely pure and free state, its effect on the human body will be far more positive than it is at the present time, Dr. Abel said.

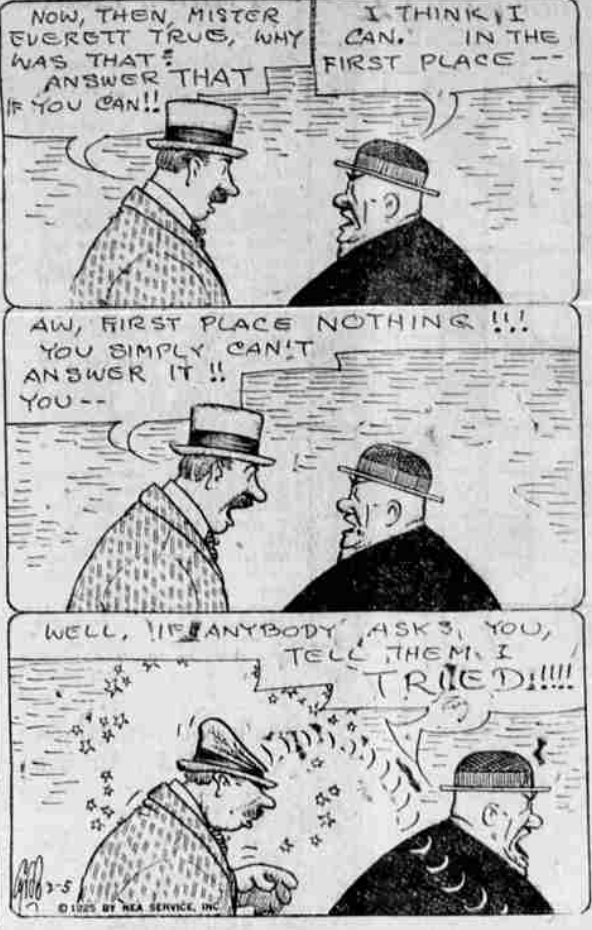

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Death Takes Peter Hose, Hawaii's "Hula Traffic Cop"

HONOLULU (AP)—Peter Hose, Hawaii's famous "hula traffic cop" is dead, a victim of tuberculosis.

Well over six feet in height, always smiling and genial, "Pete," as he was known universally, was wont to amuse and entertain visitors and residents of the islands by directing traffic at the busiest street intersection in Honolulu for the millions of a whistled hula dance. He became a well-known character both to residents and tourists, as he had served 15 years in the police department.

Some months ago he contracted tuberculosis and was placed in a sanatorium. Prior to the holiday season he suddenly arose one night, dressed and walked to his home with the remark that he desired to die in his own home among his family. Death came quietly several nights later.

Throughout the night before the funeral around Pete's coffin relatives and friends kept watch over the dead after the Hawaiian custom. The silence being punctuated occasionally by wailing, for Pete had been a native of the islands and island customs were his customs.
