Why is it that some players in overbidding of one player during an evening's play. Out of five or six bids that failed to make good, two were doubled. On ten of the hands, the player could have defeated his opponent's bid and on the other five he could have saved game. He was one of those players who consider it a personal affront to be overbid. His opponents knew he would continue to bid. Such a player is under a great handicap, and yet cannot seem to realize what is the trouble with his game. He complains of his hard luck and of the big rubbers he loses, but he hasn't the good judgment to realize that it is his temperament, rather than his bad cards, that is making him lose. Take these remarks to heart, and in the class specified, look for the result of hands in which you fail to make your bid. If you could have saved game or defeated your opponent's bid, your loss is unjustifiable.

Here is the answer to the test hand offered for your analysis in the preceding article: Hearts—10, 6 Clubs—7, 4, 2 Diamonds—9, 2 Spades—K, Q, 10, 9, 8, 7 No score, rubber game, 2 dealt and bid one diamond. A one heart, Y four diamonds, B and Z passed and bid four hearts. Y and B passed, Z doubled and A and Y passed. Should B bid four spades over the double or pass? B should bid four spades. It is a hand that is not worth a trick at hearts and yet, combined with partner's, should either make four spades or come very close to it.

Answer to Problem No. 5 Hearts—None Clubs—A, Q, 7, 6 Diamonds—None Spades—9, 8 Hearts—None Clubs—J, 9 Diamonds—A, J, 10 Spades—K, 7 Hearts—Q Clubs—10, 8, 3 Diamonds—A, 4 Spades—None

Hearts are trumps and Z is in the lead. How can Y-Z win five of the six tricks against any defense? Z should lead the ten of clubs and let B win the trick with the jack. Now, no matter what B leads, Y-Z will win the rest of the tricks. If B leads a diamond, Z will win the ace and lead the eight of clubs and finesse the queen in Y's hand. On the lead of the ace of clubs, the clubs drop and Z will discard his losing diamond on Y's six of clubs. If B leads a spade, Z will trump, make his ace of diamonds and then lead the clubs as before. The point of the problem is not to finesse the queen of clubs until the second round. This is something that comes up in every-day play so study it out carefully.

LONDON STOCKS APPRECIATED Greatly During Past Year LONDON (AP)—There has been a capital appreciation of \$1,200,000,000 in representative stock exchange securities during 1924, according to the Bankers Magazine. The beginning of the year was worrying for security holders because of the advent of a Labor government, says the magazine, but the return to power of the Conservatives imparted a good deal of confidence and a corresponding appreciation in values of stocks. Six representative ten companies' shares have risen \$27,500,000 to \$55,000,000, or more than 95 per cent; ten brewery stocks appreciated \$85,000,000; rubbers, industrials, oils and base metal shares have advanced steadily, and American and foreign railways are reported, in the aggregate, to be better.

Unemployed Speak Kindly Of Eccentric American LONDON (AP)—The unemployed at Wivenhoe, near Colchester, have found a patron in an aged wealthy American, Bayard Brown, who lives on his yacht Valreya, high and dry in a local dock, and who made a substantial donation to the unemployed Christmas fund. Some years ago Mr. Brown made a similar donation to the unemployed at Brightlingsea, where his yacht was then laid up. Mr. Brown has been somewhat of a mystery in English coast towns, as his yacht seldom puts to sea and its owner rarely leaves its deck.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A 12-year-old girl, substituting for her pastor-father in the pulpit, drew such a large crowd to a small home of worship here one Sunday recently that police were necessary to keep the overflow crowd from interrupting her sermon.

Speaking from familiar texts, Margaret Crawford, the young daughter of the Rev. R. H. Crawford, pastor of the Minnehaha Congregational church, told those who crowded every nook in the little place of the value of the Bible to the youth of today, she preached for an hour and they were acclaimed by her listeners. Marion's occupation of the pulpit followed that of her 15-year-old brother Stuart the Sunday previous. The children receive their incentive from their father, who holds the theory that preachers cannot start too young.
