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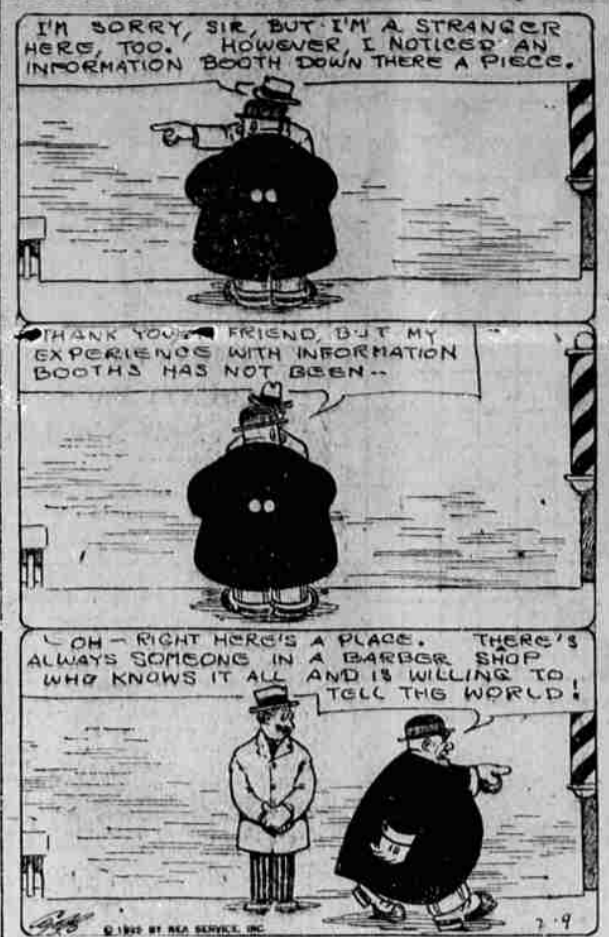

Most Beautiful L. A. Girls with Norma In "Eternal Flame."

No wonder every girl in La Grande wanted to be an extra in the hall room scenes of the Norma Talmadge feature production "The Eternal Flame!" at the Arcade Tuesday.

No wonder they made a concerted rank movement on the United Studios or that they kept the telephone lines there busy for days.

For it was conceded to be the most beautiful set ever built on a motion picture stage, and by experts who have made an extensive examination of set constructions in the United States.

It is the only stage in the world large enough to accommodate such a set, which took to erect a corps of 750 artisans, working in triple shifts of 250 men. When they finally completed their ten-day task, the hall room extending the entire length of the 240 foot stage.

When the seven hundred people were on dress rehearsal for a day before the actual shooting began, the splendor of the scene rivaled the glories of Alexandria.

The hall room of the Palace of Versailles, of which the set is a replica, had witnessed many times before scenes of ostentation, but never more pomp and ceremony than in the Second Restoration Period, about which time Balzac wrote the dramatic story in which Miss Talmadge finds fitting expression for her varied emotional powers.

Many of the girls chosen had never before been in pictures, but they were without exception the finest assemblage of loveliness to be seen anywhere—a first class birth had familiarized them with the social graces, so that they blended harmoniously into the atmosphere of the court life they depicted. So, too, the broadened palates of the era had to be re-created with a view to aristocratic cast of features to accompany the foppish attire.

The costumes were all made on the spot from plates of the period. The gowns, exquisitely influenced by the Empire, also indicated a marked preference for modification of the monochrome among such women as the Duchesse, to whom there was an expression of individuality, just as it is to the exquisitely dressed woman of today.

EVERY BABY SHOULD HAVE PHYSICAL EXAMINATION

Every baby should have a thorough physical examination immediately after birth, according to Dr. Lillian M. Whiting, writing in the January number of the Osteopathic Magazine.

Of course, the insurance companies and social service organizations have for some years been teaching us that all grown people ought to be thoroughly examined once in a while, but some of us forget that it is just as important to start with the fullest possible knowledge of the little one's exact condition.

"The framework of the body should be examined," says Dr. Whiting, "and this is very important. It must be carefully done, not only that slight variations from the normal may be recognized, but also that no harm be done by hasty handling."

"The responsibility for the occurrence of several serious abnormalities of later life rests with the ignorant or careless midwife or physician who neglects this first and important examination of the newborn child."
