TEACHERS OF COUNTY BACK NEW NORMAL

of teachers, especially in the normal school. In view of the fact that the facilities for the training of teachers in Oregon are at present inadequate, we stand in favor of an eastern Oregon Normal school.

2. We believe further that any attempt to legislate a definite program of studies for the high school is not in keeping with the ideals of democracy, that it fails to meet the problems of the community, and that it will remove the general education from the hands of educators and place it in the hands of politicians and also entail additional expense.

County Institute Backed.

3. We further believe that the county institute should be revived and wish to go on record in favor of a bill now before our state legislature providing for the re-establishment of the three day institute.

4. We wish to thank the board of education and the school people of Union for the privilege of using the high school building for the excellent luncheon served by the domestic science department, and for entertainment and courtesies shown the teachers.

5. We wish to express our appreciation of the efforts of our new county school superintendent, E. A. Sayre, for the excellent program arranged. We also pledge him our hearty support and cooperation in all his work and activities for the schools of the county.

It was voted to furnish copies of the resolutions to the various county papers, and copies were also sent to the Portland papers.

Two Institutes Set.

The superintendent announced two more institutes for the year, one at Elgin in March and a third one in La Grande on the first Saturday in April. The one at Elgin will come later in the month owing to the basketball tournament which will be in full swing on the first Saturday in March.

About seventy teachers were present, representing the schools of La Grande, Cove, Powder, Island City and many country districts. Union teachers were present 100 per cent with the exception of Pitts and Workman who were with the basketball boys on their trip into Wallowa county.
