LEIPSIC (AP)—Educational statistics for German universities covering a period of ten years show an increase of women students; a falling off in total enrollments, and a neglect of the minority.

Hints for the Housewife

HOLIDAY PARTIES YOU'LL REMEMBER What to Serve and How to Prepare Them.

February has a wealth of holidays, all of which offer splendid opportunities to give parties. Whether the hostess chooses the anniversary of Saint Valentine or the birthday of either of the great makers of history, appropriate favors and other decorative material can be bought to make the occasion festive. Since she need only choose decorations to suit her fancy, her thought and industry should be directed to the preparation of the food to be served. Suitable and attractive food will contribute more to the success of the party than any decoration.

A repast of well-garnished food helps to avoid any unpleasant after-effects or doctor's bills.

Instead of serving meat, fish and egg salads and sandwiches, try dainty sandwiches of such dried fruits as figs, dates and raisins, which contain pre-digested sugar. Attractive salads can be made from canned grapefruit, pineapple, apricot or peaches, together with many fresh fruits that you may care to employ. Fruit is very easily digested and looks very appetizing when beaped on crisp lettuce leaves. Also, there is an added advantage in the use of canned fruit. In that the syrup can be mixed with other ingredients to make refreshing drinks.

Here are a variety of helpful suggestions.

Fruit Sandwich Filling

- 1 cupful dates
1 cupful seeded raisins
1 cupful dried figs
2 cupful walnut meats
Juice of 1 orange

Put dates, raisins, figs and nuts through a food chopper. Add orange juice and mix thoroughly. Spread between buttered slices of bread.

Date Cheese Sandwich

- 1 cream cheese
1 cupful dates
1-8 cupful milk or cream

Soften the cream cheese gradually by adding the milk and cream. Then add the dates finely chopped and mix together thoroughly. Season with a little salt and spread on buttered bread.

Grapefruit Salad

- 1 can grapefruit
1 cupful shredded coconut
1 cupful maraschino cherries

Pour the syrup off the grapefruit and arrange on lettuce. Sprinkle lightly with coconut and garnish with cherries.

History Salad—Fruit of Dates

- 12 cupful dates
1 lemon
6 large apples
2 cupful chopped nuts

Remove pits from and cut each date into small pieces. Pare and core the apples and cut them into small squares. Place the fruit in a dish and squeeze the juice of a lemon over it. Mix thoroughly and then arrange on lettuce. Sprinkle with chopped nuts.

Vanilla Coconut Cookies

- 1 cupful butter
1 cupful sugar
1 egg
12 cupfuls flour
2 teaspoonfuls baking powder
1/2 teaspoonful salt
1 cupful milk
2 teaspoonfuls vanilla

1 egg yolk or white
2 cupful fresh-keeping coconut
Cream butter and add sugar slowly, creaming them together. Add well beaten egg and mix well. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together and add to egg mixture alternately with milk. Add vanilla and chill. Turn out on a floured board and roll to about one quarter inch thickness. Cut with a heart shaped cookie cutter and brush tops with slightly beaten yolk or white of egg. Sprinkle with coconut and bake in a hot oven about fifteen minutes.

Chocolate Fudge

- 2 squares unseasoned chocolate
2 cupfuls sugar
1 teaspoonful salt
1/2 cupful milk
1 tablespoonful butter
2 cupful dates
2 cupful walnut meats

Mix chocolate, sugar, salt and milk and bring to boiling point, stirring constantly until the chocolate has melted. Cook until a soft ball forms when tested in cold water. Remove from fire and add butter. Cool until the bottom of the pan no longer feels hot. Beat

Gloomy Future Seen by British Shipbuilders

GLASGOW (AP)—The immediate position and outlook in the shipbuilding industry are exceedingly grave, according to John Barr, president of the Shipbuilding Employers' Federation, in an article in the Industrial Review of the Glasgow Herald. The work in hand, where there is any, is approaching completion, and there is little, and in many shipyards nothing, to fill up empty berths, says Mr. Barr. The orders obtainable are taken by builders without hope of profit; in many cases tender prices make only part provision for establishment charges.

Such a condition of affairs, Mr. Barr adds, cannot continue indefinitely, nor even for much longer. The feeling among shipbuilders generally has been to carry on as best they can, and in doing
