CAN'T KEEP 'EM OUT OF JAIL

LOS ANGELES, (AP)—Surveys among prisoners in the Los Angeles county jail, indicate that there is something wrong with present educational and religion methods, in the opinion of Raymond L. Turney, director of the Los Angeles Crime Commission. He expressed this view at a recent meeting of the Southern California Academy of Criminology.

Seven percent of the inmates of the county jail, Mr. Turney said, were college graduates, as against 6 1/2 percent in ordinary civil life; 2 1/2 percent of the prisoners had college training; 45 percent were high school graduates, compared with 25 percent outside the walls.

All the prisoners agreed, added Mr. Turney, that there had been a lack of moral training and a defect of character-building training in the schools, and that the same thing was true of the religious.
