The Latin club held a very interesting meeting last Wednesday. The program committee with Dorothy Ann Warnick as chairman presented several numbers in Latin which were all very well received.

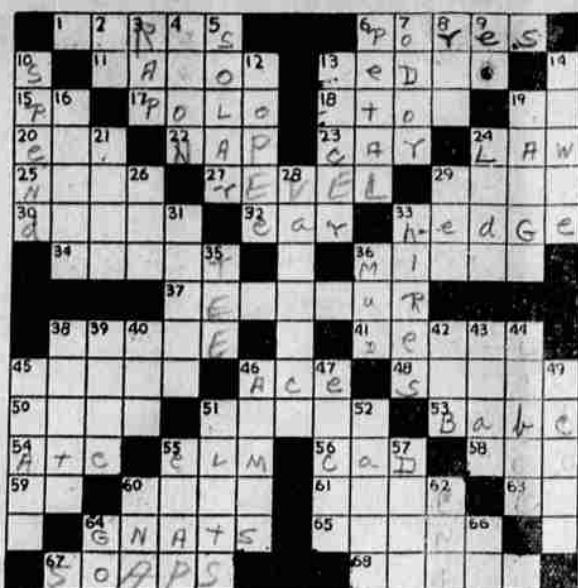
Marjorie Warnick has recently been appointed chairman of the decorating committee for the Junior-Senior banquet. Some very original ideas have been submitted.

Monument Honors First Californian Missionary. SAN FERNANDO, Cal. (AP) Another chapter of the story inscribed in the crumbling remains of a chain of 21 missions, the earliest of which were founded more than a century and a half ago in California, will be written soon with the unveiling at the San Fernando Mission of a monument to Father Junipero Serra, Spanish missionary, who established the office. The statue, depicting the mission father leading a shy Indian boy into the realm of Christianity, is of bronze and is seven feet six inches in height. It is the work of Mrs. Sally James Farham, New York sculptress.
