Cook Bay Blockade Broken. BANDON, Ore.—After being bound for periods of one to two weeks the steamer Brookline, Elizabeth and Bandon left Tuesday for San Francisco. Their combined loads totaled 1,100,000 feet of fir and spruce lumber. All three are scheduled to return promptly and will be joined by the Steamship Mary E. Moore, which has been making an extra trip into the Umpqua river. While the boats were held up the wharves of the local mills have become crowded with lumber and will furnish steady cargoes for the regular fleet until the opening of the summer cedar season.

SISKIYOU TRAINS LATE. MEDFORD, Ore.—Three feet of snow at Sisson, Calif., and two at the crest of the Siskiyou, all Southern Pacific trains from the south were from three to four hours late. The highway over the Siskiyou, however, was kept open and motor cars were coming through, although travel was difficult.

Motor buses were still running to Klamath Falls over the Green Spring highway, but if the present stormy weather continues, the road soon will be closed.

Income Tax Facts

No. 29. Various penalties are imposed by the revenue act of 1924 for failure to file a return and pay the tax on time, and for making a fraudulent return. Distinction is made between failure and "willful" failure to file a return. For failure to file the return on time, the penalty is 25 per cent of the amount of the tax, unless a return is later filed and it is satisfactory shown to the Commissioner of Internal Revenue that such failure was due to a reasonable cause and not to willful neglect. If a taxpayer exercised ordinary business care and prudence, and nevertheless was unable to file a return within the prescribed time, the delay is due to a "reasonable cause."

8000.000 LOAN SECURED. EUGENE, Ore. A trust deed given by the Tidewater Mill company, which is a subsidiary of the Porter Bros. company, which owns large tracts of timber land in western Lane county and the old Hurd sawmill at Florence, to the Detroit Trust company, securing a loan of \$500,000, was filed for record in the office County Clerk Bryson. The deed covers several thousand acres of the company's holdings. The company has issued 6 per cent bonds, \$100,000 of which are due January 1, 1931; \$100,000 due January 1, 1932; \$100,000 due January 1, 1934; and \$100,000 due January 1, 1935.
