BAKER-TIGER Sextet Plays
GAME TO BE In Pendleton
SNAPPY TILT Friday Night

La Grande fans will have another opportunity Saturday night to see what will undoubtedly be a fast, hard fought game between two closely matched basketball teams, Baker and La Grande.

The first game played two weeks ago at Baker was one of the most exciting contests the Blue and White quintet has engaged in this season. The score was similar to the La Grande-Pendleton game here last week and ended 22 to 18 in favor of Baker after the locals had been right at Baker's tail all the way through the game.

The Tigers worked against a number of disadvantages in the game at Baker. They were on a strange floor with the baskets hung from the ceiling rather than from the walls and were playing a team with a different style of offensive than that to which they had been accustomed.

Tigers Favored.

The situation will be reversed here and the Tigers should win, not by any large score but by a fair majority.

MacTavish has been coaching his team all week in an effort to strengthen the defense and with particular attention to coming with Baker's style of penetrating the five man defense.

Lineup Given.

La Grande's regular lineup, will start the game with Lyman and Glass forwards, Unamuno, center, and Hummel and Zundel guards. Hummel is in better health than he was at the time of the Pendleton and Union games and will play much better ball no doubt. Glass and Lyman are both showing marked signs of improvement and should play good ball Saturday.

The Baker squad will bring along a freshman team which will meet the local yearling aggregation preceding the main game. This contest will be sure to feature a great deal of action.

54-Year-Old Pitcher
To Take Box in Iowa

DURIQUE, Ia. (By the Associated Press)—"Iron Man" Joe McGinnity, now 54 years old, expects to pitch at least 25 games this season for the Dubuque club of the Mississippi Valley league of which he is manager and part owner.

Starting his thirty-third professional year, McGinnity is confident his "old soup bones," as he calls his right arm, will allow him to take a regular turn on the mound.

"Occasionally, I feel a little wobbly in the legs, but I believe my arm is almost as good as ever," McGinnity said.

McGinnity pitches apparently with a minimum of exertion and curves the ball almost every time he throws, refuting the popular belief that speed ball pitchers outlast those who rely on "twisters."

MUNN THROWS
ROMANO TWICE

CHICAGO (By the Associated Press)—Wayne (Big Munn, claimant of the world's heavyweight wrestling championship, Thursday night slammed Mike Romano, Italian heavyweight, to the floor twice in less than 19 minutes and won a match, best two of three falls, with the same hold that gave him recent victories over E. "Strangler" Lewis and Stanislaus Zbyszko.

In each instance Romano was stunned.

Romano took two healthy swings at Munn as he backed away while the big Nebraskan bore down on him as the second session opened. Munn had scarcely arrived within reaching distance of his adversary when he gathered him in his arms and hoisted him high above his head for the grand fall.

Romano was not expected to do the headlock against Munn, had little opportunity to try it.

The time of the second fall was 47 seconds.

Franco-Gerget of Italy, who finished in second place in the six-day bicycle race in Madison Square Garden last fall with young Bobby Wallhouse as a team mate, will be paired with Gastona Belloni in the March contest.

Jack O'Neill, who won the single scull championship in America in 1909 and who last summer, as a member of the St. Mary's four of eight, completed his 25th year as an oarsman, has announced his retirement.

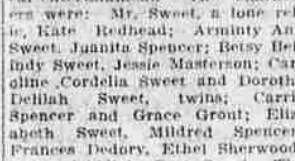

Surrey Residents
Would Close Track

WEYBRIDGE, Eng. (AP)—Residents of the very select neighborhood of Weybridge in Surrey long ago protested to the authorities regarding the noise and smell which they have to endure because of the proximity of the famous Brooklands automobile racing track.

These protests so far have fallen upon deaf ears, but the last has not yet been heard of, for the owners of the St. George's Hill estate and (in Weybridge and Byfleet) residents have served a writ upon the Brooklands Automobile Racing Club with a view to having the track closed on the grounds that noise of racing constitutes a nuisance, destroys the peace of the rural neighborhood and causes serious deterioration to property.

For 18 years the majority of airplane and auto experiments and tests have made at Brooklands, and it is claimed that an automobile passes through stiffer tests here within 24 hours than is possible in a full year on roads. This threat of legal action has not deterred club officials, who have arranged full program race meetings for the ensuing year.

English Speaking Union
Opens Branch in Manila

MANILA (AP)—A branch of the English Speaking Union, an organization with societies in many parts of the world to promote friendly relations between English speaking peoples, has been formed in Manila. The organization here, which is to be known as a branch of the New York society, was formed under the initiative of Bishop Gouverneur F. Mosher of the Protestant Episcopal church.

Governor General Leonard Wood was named honorary president. Brigadier General Frank R. McCoy, president; Thomas Harrington, British consul general at Manila, vice president; and Eugene A. Gilmore, vice governor of the Philippine Islands, second vice president.

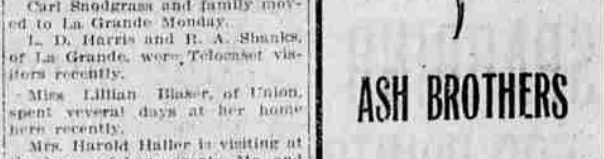
