Coos Bay Bridge Improved.

MARSHFIELD, Ore.—The Southern Pacific Railway company has completed the installation of a large steel span on its Coos bay bridge. The span was constructed without any interruption to traffic and installed under the same conditions. The span which it replaced was shoved from the bridge piers to the waters of the bay in the spring of 1924 by the Stout Lumber company steamer Martha Buchner, which missed the draw opening and collided with the bridge. The damage to the Martha Buchner was slight.

RAILWAY WORK TO START EUGENE, Ore.—Work is expected to be started in a short time on the ten miles of railway to be built by J. H.
