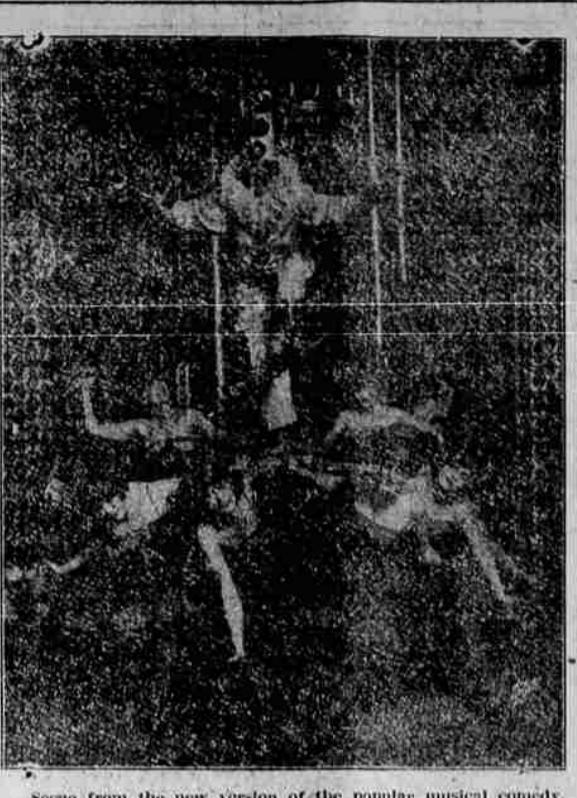

The success of Mary Carr and Johnnie Walker in "Over the Hill" is so well remembered that it is only necessary to all it to mind to appreciate how effective this inevitable team proves in Emory Johnson's great F. That is the full explanation of "Bringing Up Father in Ireland" which comes to the Arcade theatre Tuesday for an engagement of one night. The play hasn't a particle of rhyme or reason to it. No attempt to present art, either in music or scenic venture.
