## WIRELESS TO MELT METALS

SHEFFIELD, Eng., (AP)—Wireless is to be introduced into the steel industry of Sheffield for the purpose of melting metals, announcement to this effect being made by Dr. C. H. Douch, dean of the faculty of metallurgy at the University of Sheffield. Wireless valves can be used to melt masses of steel into white-hot liquid.

Dr. Douch said, and within a few months there would be furnaces here worked by these valves.

"Furnaces have actually been built in which the motive power for melting the metal is supplied by large thermionic valves," Dr. Douch announced, "and these are of special use in the manufacture of certain nickel alloys."

to alternating current of extremely high frequency—much higher in fact than can be obtained from a mechanical generator of alternating current. This current is passed through the metal, which only is said to melt itself.

"The melting metal," Dr. Douch added, "is often far hotter than the crucible in which it is being heated. A piece of Swedish iron was melted in this way before the crucible in which it was containing thoroughly quenched."

Americans in Berlin Warn Against Rash Investments

BERLIN (AP)—There is growing anxiety in American commercial circles doing business in Germany over the wildcat schemes promoted by unscrupulous brokers in New York, Chicago and other cities, who entice Americans to invest in German bonds and stocks of doubtful value. It is felt that these operations not only harm people of moderate means who can ill afford to lose the money, but that they also undermine faith in legitimate business undertakings.

Every day pathetic letters come pouring into the American Chamber of Commerce here from men and women in the United States who have invested in worthless paper marks, or in securities of concerns that have long gone bankrupt. The chamber recommends earnestly that all such prospective investors investigate thoroughly before giving up their money.

Amateurs Nurse Grievances Against Old Radio Station

LONDON (AP)—The wireless "howler" which so seriously interfered with reception from the United States during the recent wireless week, has been discovered. It is the old wireless station at Northolt, Middlesex, constructed 15 years ago, and described by up-to-date enthusiasts as being hopelessly inefficient, and whose "chirps, scutters and whistles" is it sends out the Morse messages, are ruining wireless reception all over the country.

## OREGON GIFT DRIVE MOVES

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Ore. (Special)—After two years and four months' effort, the University of Oregon has obtained in its gift campaign contributions and pledges amounting to \$2,200,000. This report was formally made today to alumni and the public by the following directors of the Alumni Holding company, Robert B. Kuykenhall, Frank L. Chambers, Campbell Church and W. K. Newell. All members were present at a special meeting with the execution of President E. L. Campbell, who is ill in Coronado, Cal.

The directors met at the suggestion of President Campbell to make plans for the continuation of the campaign. The original plan set the goal at \$5,000,000 in five years and will be followed. Mrs. Church came from Coronado to bring words of encouragement and congratulation to the directors.

"Before summer is out we fully expect to reach the halfway mark, or \$2,500,000," said Mr. Kuykenhall, chairman of the annual campaign. More than 2000 alumni and former students have subscribed \$480,000. The alumni quota is \$1,600,000 and we shall put on a spring campaign to complete this amount. Meantime, the campaign for a fine arts building, under the direction of Mrs. George H. Geringer, will continue and will receive every aid from us."

The gift campaign, according to the decision of the directors of the holding company, will have three phases between now and spring. Both the alumni efforts and the fine arts building campaign will be prosecuted. The student body of the University will put on a campaign to add subscriptions of all unpledged undergraduates to the

student union fund. Last year in a whirlwind campaign of a week \$200,000 was pledged. Campaigners in the spring will obtain subscriptions from this year's freshmen class and other new students.

SEASIDE COTTAGE BURNS SEASIDE, Ore.—The summer home of Mrs. L. F. McNeil, 625 East Morrison street, Portland, was destroyed by fire, believed of incendiary origin, at an early hour. About a fortnight ago the cottage was fired, but the flames were extinguished before much damage was done. At that time officials found that oily rags had been placed in the building.
