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Good American Dollars Rout British Beetles

LINCOLN, Eng. (AP)—The appearance of the death watch beetle in the timbering of one of the towers of Lincoln Cathedral is causing the dean much trouble, but he is equally disappointed with what he calls the stinginess of English people in sending funds to assist in combating the work of the beetle, and in the restoration of the cathedral.

The generosity of Americans, the dean says, is in great contrast. American money, he points out, has enabled nearly half the work to be done—and by the end of the year he expects to have enough American dollars to pay for the restoration of the central tower and two transepts.

Scores of English tourists visit the cathedral but few of them go to him with a ten pound note, as the Americans do, and say "here is a trifle for your fund," according to the dean.

"RICHARD, THE LION-HEARTED" is the title chosen for the Associated Authors' screen version of Sir Walter Scott's famous novel, "The Talisman," an Allied Producers and Distributors Corporation release coming to the Sherry theatre.
