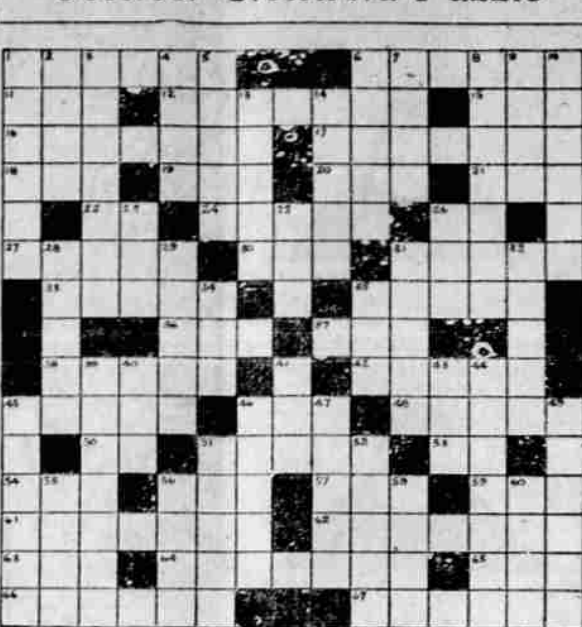

Sea Lions Boosted as Prize Household Pets

LONDON (AP)—The sea lion is the ideal pet and the perfect friend of man, according to recommendations made by members of the Amateur Menagerie club, who published recently a book on their various experiences with animals.

Owing to the expense of the upkeep of a sea lion, however, it is not probable that they will ever replace cats and dogs as pets. A sea lion has all the intelligence of a dog, adaptability and affection, and requires no expensive, but ordinarily it costs from \$500 to \$700 a year to keep a pet of this kind.

One of the club members, L. H. Brightwell, has had much experience with sea lions as pets and highly recommends them. In his opinion it is only the high rate for the use of water and the cost of fish as food which prevents the sea lion becoming a universal pet.

"Greed is undoubtedly the sea lion's one great fault," writes Mr. Brightwell, "but given enough fish a sea lion may be taught anything. His amazing gift of balancing, diving and forming picturesque groups are implanted in him by nature."

Moscow Undecided How Best to Curb Maria Spiridonova

MOSCOW (AP)—Maria Spiridonova, probably the most famous of all Russian woman revolutionists, is on a hunger strike in a Moscow prison and it is reported that the Bolshevik officials are about to deport her to Turkmenia.

Russia Goldmann and other radical have been exiling every effort to have Spiridonova released from Russia, that she might recruit her broken health in Germany. But Moscow officials are apparently afraid to let her leave Russian soil. She is the idol of the revolutionists and is believed by them to have a charmed life.

As a young girl Spiridonova bombed a Russian provincial governor who was notorious for his brutal treatment of the peasantry. She suffered every indignity at the hands of czarist officers and was sentenced to death. But this young school teacher who had made such a battle against the tsarist government of the peasantry was too well known to be executed, and was banished to Siberia.

The 1917 revolution brought her back to Petrograd, and although she was not a Bolshevik, she induced the social revolutionists of the left to co-operate with the Lenin forces, and became a powerful factor in the congress of soldiers, sailors and workers which brought the Bolshevik government into existence and launched the end of the tsarist regime.

But Spiridonova was opposed to the Brest-Litovsk Treaty. She led the fight against the shipment of grain and cloth from war-torn Russia to Germany, and opposed Lenin's efforts to arrange the purchase payments against the thirty payments who had managed to buy a few sheep and cows. In the All-Russian Soviet Congress in July, 1918, Spiridonova openly assailed Lenin's policy and defied the German ambassador, Mirbach, who was subsequently lynched.

Since that speech Spiridonova has never been a free woman. For a time she was in a sanatorium and the Bolshevik authorities declared she was mentally irresponsible. Later she has been in various prisons and under guard in villages near Moscow. But at all times she has realized her steps were dogged by the secret police and she has more than once appealed to the officials to release her. In 1921, she said she preferred actual imprisonment to the semi-constant oppression.

Printers Assist to Indict Rum Forgers

WASHINGTON (AP)—How the government printing office traced counterfeit and illegally used permits, the conviction of seven men who participated in one of the biggest whisky frauds ever prosecuted under the prohibition law has been disclosed in the annual report of George H. Carter, the public printer.

Three hundred suspected permits for the withdrawal of whisky from bonded warehouses had been seized by the department of justice and the bureau of internal revenue, and constituted the only material evidence in the government's case against the distillery of A. G. McKelvin Bros. Co. and 13 individual defendants, charged with the illegal withdrawal of large quantities of bonded whisky from Pittsburgh warehouses.

A number of these permits, however, had been so cleverly imitated by the photo-engraving process that they completely defied all attempts at detection by experts, and the defendants' contention that they were legitimate permits issued by government officials seemed for a time to be irrefutable.

The public printer finally suggested that a test be made of the paper used in both the genuine and the false permits. It was learned that the true permits were on a 50 per cent rag paper, with the government's water-mark, running throughout the sheet. The suspected permits on the other hand, were printed on paper on which the water-mark, although correctly reading "Internal Revenue Prohibition," ran across instead of lengthwise of the sheet. Furthermore, the paper varied in composition from all wood pulp to 25 per cent rag content.
