CALEXICO, Calif. (AP).—This is the story of a hunk-plate that brought luck. The talisman is a 20 peso Mexican gold piece and Joe Hardwick, chief of police of this border city, credits the coin with saving his life while attempting to arrest a negro. The negro fled and the bullet struck the coin, knocking it from a circular holder where it rested as a watch charm over the officer's head. He scamped with a superfluous wound.

The coin that formed the watch charm was given to Hardwick several years ago by a Mexican official, accompanied by the admonition: "Wear this always. It will bring you luck."

The charm is assured of immortality in the archives of Calixico, for the city council has resolved: "We are grateful that, due to the intervention of a watch charm, providentially worn, the bullet fired by the would-be assassin was deflected from its course."

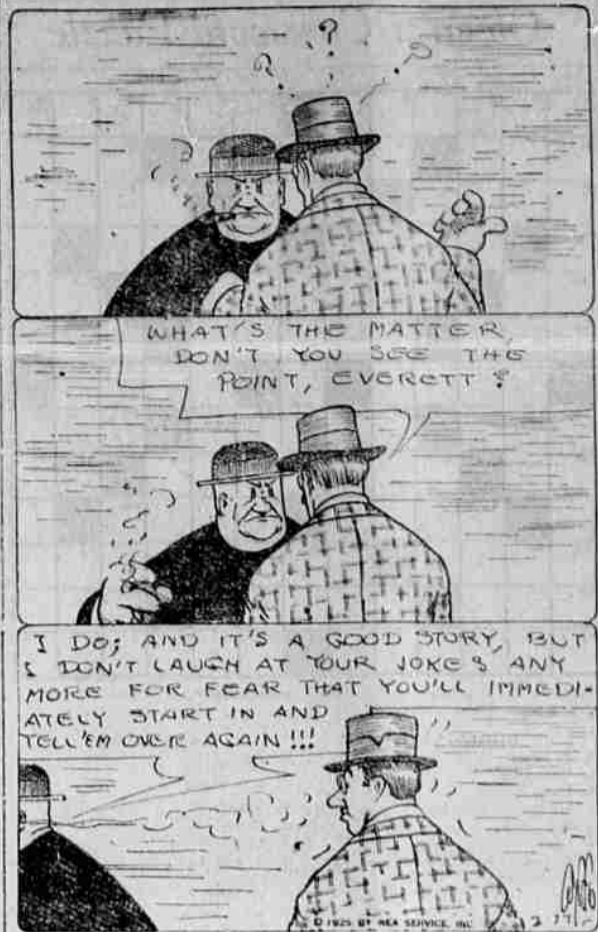

Tremendous "Punch" In "Richard, the Lion-Hearted."

Fulfilling the most enthusiastic predictions of early reviewers, "Richard, the Lion-Hearted," Associated Authors' screen version of "The Tallman," an Allied Producers and Distributors Corporation release, is proving one of the screen sensations of the season at Sherry's.

Touching the highlights of the adventurous King Richard's career and based on his Third Crusade into the Holy Land, "Richard, the Lion-Hearted," has been produced with a lavishness that lends it powerful historical and entertainment appeal.

In stupendous settings, constructed with a keen appreciation of conformity to historical records, the scenes of conflict between King Richard's valiant knights and the swarming Saracen infidels who had gained possession of the Holy Sepulchre, have been screened with inspiring realism. The stirring action of the picture, combined with the throbbing romance of the story, carries a tremendous "punch" that cannot fall further than Oscar Scott's famous novel, on which it is based.

Costumes of unsurpassed beauty have been used throughout the production. Forty thousand dollars was spent in providing the magnificent robes of velvet, satin, silk and fur worn by the king, the queen and the court ladies. The chain mail suits worn by the knights proved even more costly than the fabric costumes as they had to be made to order for the production.

Wallace Berry's characterization of Richard stands out as one of the finest pieces of screen delineation ever drawn, while other members of the cast, includes Kathleen Clifford, Marguerite de la Motte, John Bowers, Charles Gerard, Clarence Geldert, Wilbur High and Tully Marshall give equally creditable performances.

Notable as a book and decidedly a success on the stage, "The Man Who Came Back" is greater as a motion picture. This Fox production came to the Arcade Theatres last night to open a three day run. A capacity audience appeared to enjoy every minute of it and lobby comment afterward was limited to praise.

It is doubtful if George O'Brien or Dorothy Mackall will ever be cast in parts more peculiarly fitted to their respective ability. As the black sheep son of a rich New

Yorker, O'Brien plays one of the most effective characterizations ever shown on a screen. Dorothy Mackall does no less as the dance hall performer of San Francisco's old Barbary Coast and later, in the underworld of Shanghai.

As the story progresses you follow the action so closely that your heart sinks as the heart of the boy must sink when life reaches out and drags him down into its lowest places. That is the thing about the whole picture which will strike the observer most forcibly—the sympathy of it—the natural sequences and the lifelike trend of the story.

There is a villain in the story, played by Cyril (Madwick) a suave, easy-going, aloof, individual and you even like him the way the role is handled. This is true of the part of the father played by Ralph Lewis. In fact, every character is one that most people recognize and understand.

The work of Dorothy Mackall is positively brilliant. As the ambitious, first rate, successful, dancing girl, she is willing to make any sacrifice to save the man she loves. And as it happens, much to the delight of the audience, she is successful in the end without having had to make too great a sacrifice.

"The Man Who Came Back" was directed by Emmett Flynn and he has done a fine thing. The story was based on the novel by John Fleming Wilson, from which Jules Ekert Goodson built his play adapted by William A. Brady in 1917. Mary Nash and Henry Hull had the leading roles and well as they played them, their work was never superior to that of the leads in this picture.

Argentina to Get Rockefeller Aid to Fight Tropical Diseases

REUNION AIGRES (AP).—The Rockefeller Foundation will aid the Argentine sanitary authorities in fighting tropical diseases in northern Argentina. It has notified Dr. Gregorio Arana Alfaro, director of National Hygiene Department.

Dr. Alfaro recently returned from the United States where he explained the conditions prevailing in that region to Rockefeller Foundation officials. It is understood that the Foundation will send a commission to Argentina to arrange preliminary details and the manner wherein the aid will be rendered.
