CHICAGO (AP)—Because he could hire a model for \$15 a month, and that other things were relatively cheaper and easier, Edith Vedder, the noted American painter of southwestern life, chose to spend more than 40 years in Rome rather than practice his profession at home. So spoke George R. Barnes, Vedder's confidant and neighbor on the island of Capri, who has just brought here an exhibition of some of Vedder's works.

The younger men can, but I am of the old school. "Over there I hire a model to pose for me exclusively, and it is understood that she is to pose for me whenever I need her and as long as I want her to. I pay her \$15 to \$18 a month and when I am away she can work at anything else she desires."

Spike Malone, who has been employed here for some time left for Longview, Wash., where he has accepted a position.

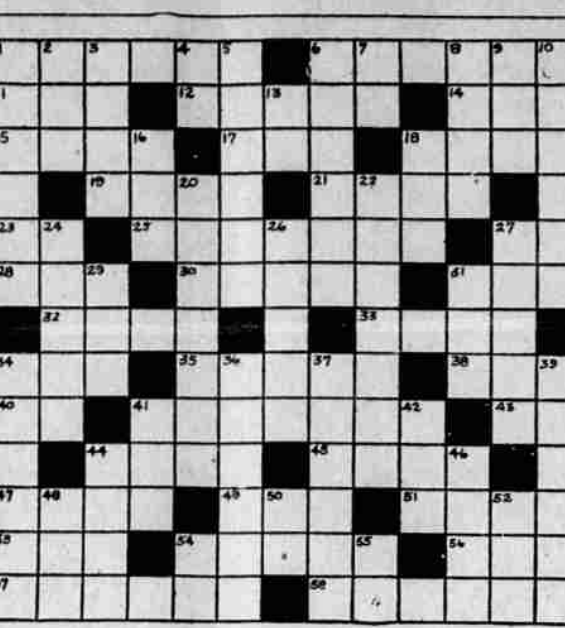
W. J. Cantrell is running the main line crew during the illness of W. A. Mackenzie.

# Steel Corporation's Policy Sets Industry's Pay is Claim

NEW YORK (AP)—The far-reaching extent to which the policy of the United States Steel Corporation determines the wage scale of steel workers throughout the industry and thereby makes difficult the development of the employees' representation movement is shown in a report issued today by the Industrial Studies Department of the Russell Sage Foundation. The report is the result of a five-year investigation of the industrial representation plan of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, one of the independent steel companies of which the Incorporated family is principal owner.

The report declares that through the Rockefeller employees' representation plan, the men in the steel works of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company were able to secure the actual eight-hour day five years before the Steel Corporation and the rest of the industry adopted it. It points out that because this company took the initiative in the wage scale of its competitors, chief among which is the Steel Corporation, its workmen have no real share in the determination of their wages. This, the report says, limits seriously the scope of the employees' representation plan which in other respects has accomplished much good.

In an industry so devoid of any tradition concerning representation of the workers as the steel industry, declared Mary Van Kleeck, director of the Foundation's Department of Industrial Studies, "the industrial representation plan of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company marks a distinct step in advance for under the plan the men in the steel works of this company secured such important gains as the actual eight-hour day, an opportunity to participate in wage-making scales, a method of presenting and discussing grievances, and a greater degree of security in their jobs through the right to appeal to higher officials against the decisions of foremen and superintendents. Nevertheless, until the men throughout the industry as a whole secure adequate and effective representation in determining wage standards, those employed in any one plant such as the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company's steel works, are bound to be dissatisfied."
