GRADE SCHOOL CONTEST ON

Fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade pupils of the Union county schools are now working on essays for the fourth annual dental essay contest.

The contest is financed by the state board of dental examiners and approved by J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction.

The purpose of the contest is to bring home to the children a realization of the relation of good teeth to good health.

Rules and Regulations. 1. Subjects—For fifth and sixth grades, "Our Guardian Angels Good Teeth and Good Health."

For seventh and eighth grades, "Good Teeth and Good Health, Now and Forever, One and Inseparable."

2. Length—For fifth and sixth grades not to exceed 400 words.

For seventh and eighth grades not to exceed 600 words.

3. Time Limitation - All essays shall be in the hands of the county superintendent not later than April 1.

4. Contentants shall use legal cap paper, writing on only one side with pen and ink.

5. The teacher shall give a series of lessons on the care of the teeth with the purpose of giving pupils material with which to work.

6. In each county each district of the first class shall be a contest unit. All the county lying outside districts of the first class shall be a contest unit.

7. Multnomah county shall be divided into four contest units: (a) All of the Portland schools on the west side of the Willamette river.

(b) All East Portland schools north of Sullivan's Gulch. (c) All East Portland schools south of Sullivan's Gulch.

(d) All other schools in Multnomah county.

8. Each pupil shall place the number of his school district, his grade and an essay number, given him by his teacher, at the top of each sheet on which he writes. Pupil's name should not appear on the manuscript.

9. Each pupil after completing his essay shall submit a form containing the following: The name of the county in which he lives, his grade, the number of his school district, his essay number, the affirmation (I hereby declare on my honor that I have received no help from any one in the composition part of this essay), followed by his name.

10. Prizes— (a) A prize of ten dollars in each county for the best essay for fifth and sixth grades in districts of the county lying outside districts of the first class.

(b) A prize of ten dollars in each county for the best essay for seventh and eighth grades in districts of the county lying outside of districts of the first class.

(c) A prize of ten dollars for the best essay for fifth and sixth grades for each district of the first class in the county.

(d) A prize of ten dollars for the best essay for seventh and eighth grades for each district of the first class in the county.

(e) A prize of twenty-five dollars for the best fifth and sixth grade essay in the state for all districts lying outside of districts of the first class.

(f) A prize of twenty-five dollars for the best seventh and

eight grade essay in the state for all districts, lying outside of districts of the first class. (g) A prize of twenty-five dollars for the best fifth and sixth grade essay in the state from district of the first class. (h) A prize of twenty-five dollars for the best seventh and eighth grade essay in the state from districts of the first class.

Kentucky Election Case Fourth Murder Trial Set

JACKSON, Ky., (AP)—The fourth trial in the series of "May-hole cases," as the murder indictments against 12 men for the election day shooting of 1921 are known, has been set for March 25 before Judge T. W. Gardner.

One of the first trials resulted in conviction of the member of the Republican group of defendants, William Barnett, whose two-year prison sentence will expire this spring, while two trials of the Democratic group resulted in a disengagement of the jury and a conviction was reversed on appeal.

The shooting resulted in four deaths and 17 wounded. It followed the invasion of one party stronghold by members of another party on election morning.

All concerned in the shooting signed a petition to the county judge and commonwealth's attorney that they "failed to see where any good can result in litigation over the matter" and asked the county officials to "let bygones be bygones." The prosecution, however, was soon begun.

The three trials so far have been held in Boyd county, on charges of venue from Breathitt county, the scene of the shooting.

The approaching trial will be with other members of the Republican group as defendants. They accused of the murder of the three Democrats slain, demanded separate trials.
