SAXAPHONE IS GIVEN BACKING

LONDON (AP)—A good word at last has been said for the saxophone. Quite a number of letter writers to London newspapers have come to the defense of the instrument and by argument and facts have endeavored to shift the onus onto the jazz "saxophonists" and not the instrument itself.

The saxophone was not an accident by any means, it is explained in the Star, having been invented by Antoine Joseph Sax, born at Dinant, Belgium, November 6, 1814, the son of a reed instrument maker. He studied at the Brussels Conservatory of Music and his proficiency on both the flute and the clarinet became marked. There were many opportunities for Sax to become a musician of note, but he preferred to return to the bench.

Moving to Paris in 1842, Sax produced the first "saxhorn" in 1843. In 1846 a soprano saxophone was manufactured and patented, followed by the family of the alto, tenor and baritone saxophone. Sax, however, failed to profit by his work and at the age of 52 he died penniless and pretty well forgotten even in musical circles.

Nome Epidemic Recalls Former Dog Team Feat

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—Establishment of a speed record for a relay run of 450 miles by dog team from Nome on the Alaska railroad to Nome, on the Bering Sea, recalled to Dr. J. B. Beeson of this city a trip he made in 1921 to Iditarod, a former Alaskan gold camp, 600 miles. Antitoxin to fight a diphtheria epidemic was carried on each journey.

Two Oregon players have been generally selected on the all-star team of the northern section of the Pacific coast conference. They are Okerberg, of Salem, center, who leads in scoring with 91 points, and Westergren, of Astoria, guard. Westergren ranked third in scoring with 76 points, just two behind Hooketh of Washington who is in second place. Hager, of the Aggie star, scored three points fewer than Westergren.

HOPE FOR GEORGE WANES
BEND, Ore.—Hopes for the safety of Charlie George, trapper, who has been missing for five weeks, were virtually abandoned when three men, J. O. Gerking, C. A. Adams and Clyde Short, returned from a three-day search in the snow-covered Cascades of central Oregon. It is possible that the body of the missing trapper is in Crater creek cabin on the broken top plateau, but this cabin is buried under snow, which averages 30 feet in depth.

A party of searchers guided by some person who knows the exact location of the cabin probably will leave Bend in the next few days to dig through the snow to the cabin.

Last Quarter Shows Idle Tonnage More

LIVERPOOL (AP)—The poor state of the shipping industry is shown by figures published regarding idle tonnage at some of the principal ports during the quarter ended December, 1924, as compared with the previous quarter. Liverpool shows the highest increase with 50,000 tons more idle than in the October quarter; Hull increased by 39,000 tons, London 36,000, Glasgow 25,000, Bristol 10,000 and Leigh 10,000 tons.
