 GENEVA (AP)—All Switzerland is talking about letters written to Swiss newspapers concerning Germany's military position by Prof. Paul Seppel of the Federal Polytechnic College of Zurich. Prof. Seppel depicts a present day Germany, imperialistic in nature, and insists that within a very brief period Germany will be able to place in the field a large and menacing army. His letters constitute a sequel to the recent report made by General Morgan of England concerning German military preparations.

"I do not believe in an immediate war," he continues, "but I am convinced that there is developing a situation which will permit the German imperialists to cast off their masks and show all their arrogance and all their ambitions.
