Scarlet and emerald have proved thus far to be the most popular colors of all, but these shades are often overlooked by buyers who insist upon matching their hosiery and millinery even if the protection from the sun or rain have to be made to order.

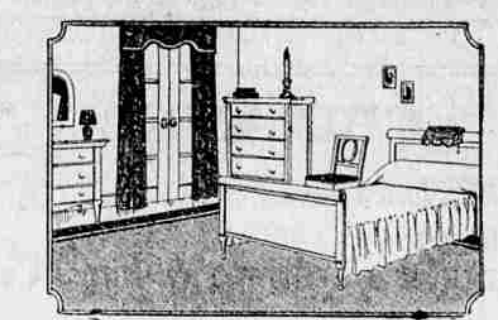

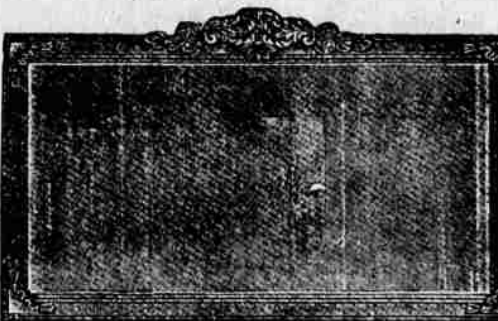

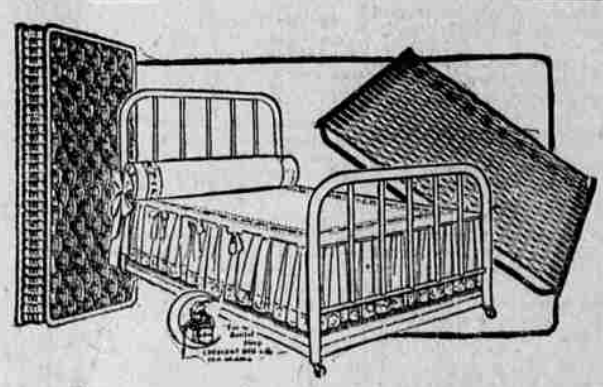

Cross-Word Puzzle Cocktail

1 cup diced grapefruit pulp
1 cup orange pulp
1 cup Marshmallows, berries
Sugar
Lemon juice or grape juice

Puzzle Pudding

2 tbsp. granulated gelatine

2 cups strong boiling coffee
