Don't be satisfied in trying to protect yourself alone, but cultivate the habit of looking out for the other fellow as well; by doing so we will all be afforded double protection.

According to reliable statistics, 83,000 persons lost their lives as the result of accidents in continental United States during the year 1923. I firmly believe that 85 per cent of all accidents are due to man-failure, because when an accident is investigated to a conclusion it is found invariably that man has blundered.

We naturally wonder what has brought about this condition. To me it seems to be the result of impatience, too much speed, rushing through life unconsciously, and lack of forethought. This condition must be reversed before we will get the desired results. Speed in itself is necessary in many instances for the safety of mankind, but it should never be practiced by the inefficient man by the man who does not know. When we move faster than we think, we are endangering our own lives and the lives of others. The man who knows and thinks a little ahead at all times is a safe and efficient man; he knows when it is safe to speed and when necessary to slow down. The inefficient man does not give these matters any thought. He drives his automobile at a high rate of speed, attempts to make a short turn, and has an accident which possibly results in injury or death to himself or others. If he is fortunate enough to survive and is questioned the answer is, "I didn't know," or "I didn't think."

Safety Teaching.

It is plain to be seen that it will take years of education, possibly a generation, to change these conditions. Safety measures should be taught in all schools where they will be instilled into young minds and at all public gatherings as well as among our associates at every opportunity. This education will take time. In the meantime, however, we are getting results every day, as shown by statistics, so let's not become discouraged but keep hammering away.

found in the fact that the lease agreement "was made in secret by private negotiations, without advertisement of competitive bidding," and that Mr. Fall discriminated prospective bidders for the lease.

Summing up its complaint, the government alleged that Mr. Fall and Mr. Sinclair conspired to defraud the United States, and that the result was the leasing of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve lands to the Mammoth company "at an inadequate, improper and fraudulent consideration."

The Mammoth company, as well as the Sinclair Crude Oil Purchasing company and the Sinclair Pipe Line company, who also were named defendants in the action, entered demurrals to the allegations in the government's petition.

The answer of the Mammoth company denied all charges of collusion or fraud in connection with the leasing of the oil reserve; denied the government's charge that the executive order issued by President Harding was illegal and contended with the government that if it were obtained on misrepresentations from Secretary Fall, that neither the company nor anyone connected with it knew of such.

Separate answers were filed by the crude oil and pipe line companies, the latter setting forth that it had spent or would have spent \$1,999,000 for a pipe line to the
