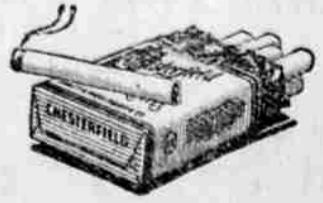

Kid Kaplan to Meet French Champion Soon

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Louis "Kid" Kaplan, champion featherweight boxer of Meriden, Conn., has been matched to meet Edouard Mascart, French featherweight, in a contest to be held in the Yankee stadium, New York, some time in June. It was announced here Sunday night by "Scotty" Montell, manager of Kaplan. Montell arrived here Sunday night to witness Kaplan's bout with Johnny Farr of Oakland, in Oakland Wednesday night. According to Kaplan, Mascart will leave France within a few weeks to begin training in this country. Under a deal closed with Tex Rickard, fight promoter, Kaplan will receive a \$25,000 split in the gate receipts or can agree instead to accept 51 1/2 per cent of the proceeds of the fight. Kaplan was named featherweight champion recently by the New York state boxing commission following his victory over Danny Kramer.

GOODRICH WINS DECISION

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, New York (AP)—Jimmy Goodrich, Buffalo lightweight, won a judge's decision verdict over K. C. Jaquet of Toledo in the first of Monday night's bouts in the second round of the lightweight elimination tournament at Madison Square Garden. Jaquet weighed 134 and his opponent one pound more.

Benny Valgar of New York won a verdict on points from Basil Galiano of New Orleans in a tame 12-round exhibition. Valgar showed boxing supremacy over his opponent, while Galiano had the better punch, but could not land it. Galiano weighed 124 1/2; Valgar, 121.

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
