DALLAS, Ore.—Conditional pardons were granted Friday by Governor Pierce to Frank Cooper and Marvin Calkins, two Alsea youths who were sentenced at the January term of court to serve three years in the penitentiary. The two were charged with a statutory offense against a young Alsea girl. The provision in Cooper's pardon was a command to marry the young woman involved, which he did. The condition of Calkins' pardon was that he live with, support and conduct himself as a good husband toward the woman whom he has married since his conviction. The men have been out on bonds, pending an appeal.

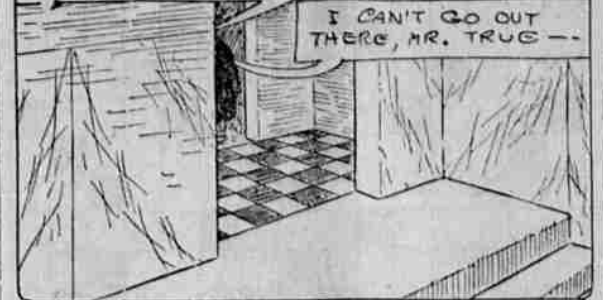
