

# SALEM DEFEATS WALLOWA 25 TO 10

## ELIMINATES BRANCHLINE CHAMPIONS

SALEM, Ore. (By the Associated Press).—The Salem high school basketball team defeated the first Wallowa five 25 to 10 here last night in the first game of the state basketball tournament.

### Wallowa Out.

Wallowa's loss eliminates her from further play in the state tournament.

In the second game last night, according to word received in La Grande this morning, Medford high defeated Franklin of Portland, 18-8, eliminating the latter.

Today Medford will play Pendleton, which will probably eliminate the Buckaroos as Medford is favored to win the tournament by most critics.

### NURMI BREAKS RECORD

NEW YORK (AP).—Paavo Nurmi of Finland broke his own 2000 meter record Thursday night in a special two-mile race. His time of 8 minutes 26 2-5 seconds, bettered by two-fifths of a second the mark he made in Madison Square Garden January 15. The Olympic champion covered the two miles in 9:03 1-2, five seconds behind his record. He had no trouble in lapping Andy Crow of New York and Jimmy Connelly, former Georgetown university star.

### NEWS ITEMS FROM THE CAMPS

NEW YORK (AP).—Leon (Goose) Gault singled in the 12th inning at West Palm Beach Wednesday and Earl McNeely stood at the plate with one run needed. Somewhere just such a situation had appeared before in baseball history except that on the previous occasion, Muddy Ruel was out on the lips waiting deliverance. The Giants won from the Senators in the second game of the spring series, 2 to 1, which indicates that baseball history does not repeat itself, for on that well remembered previous occasion in the Washington park, McNeely produced the hit which won the hit and the one and only world series. Brooklyn's pitchers held the St. Louis Browns to five hits at Targeon Springs but the Browns won, 7 to 3.

### WASHINGTON (AP).—

Manager Harris was finding solace in the second training motel out to the Senators by the Giants at West Palm Beach Wednesday in the showing of his two recruit pitchers. Jim McNamara, the newcomer from Wichita, allowed only one hit in his four rounds, that a scratch affair, while Harry Kelly granted only two in his two innings.

### CHICAGO (AP).—

The three-game series with Los Angeles opens the training schedule.

### CLEVELAND (AP).—

Observers with the Cleveland Indians at Lakeland are more optimistic over the pitchers than for several years at this stage of the season. In addition to the veterans who spent

three weeks in preliminary training at Hot Springs, several of the recruits are in great shape.

PITTSBURGH (AP).—The Pirates' regular lineup was intact for the first time this training season when the veterans arrayed themselves against the rookies at Paso Robles, Calif., Wednesday and the youngsters had to content themselves with the short end of a 10-8 score. Glenn Wright, first string shortstop, figured conspicuously in the game.
