### BROWN AND W. STODDARD MENTIONED

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Two Oregon Agricultural college basketball players and one each from Oregon, California and Washington are placed on the all-coast intercollegiate basketball team selected by J. Fred Bohler, director of athletics of Washington State college, and announced Saturday night.

Hesketh, Washington, and Riddings, O. A. C., are named forwards; Higgins, California, center; and Biele, O. A. C., and Westgren, Oregon, guards.

Honorable mention is given to the following:  
Forwards — Nevers, Stanford; Hobson, Oregon; Frayne, Washington; Nedrez, Idaho; Baker, O. A. C., and Kelso, W. S. C.

Centers — Okerberg, O. A. C.; Illman, Montana; Brown, O. A. C.; and Anderson, Washington.

Guards — Hale, Washington; Nelson, Idaho; Stoddard, O. A. C.; Belasco, California, and Reese, W. S. C.

In making the selection of the team, Director Bohler stated he was guided by the general effectiveness and value to the team's particular style of play of a player. Instead of on a mathematical basis, Bohler is a member of the national intercollegiate basketball rules committee.

George Brown, of Union, and Waldo "Pete" Stoddard, of La Grande, are both regulars on the Aggie five. Both are given honorable mention by Bohler, who selects the mythical aggregation each year for publication in the basketball guide, which is a signal honor for the Union county boys. Boh-

ler, in his remarks, states that Brown and Higgs were closely matched and that Stoddard was a "wonderful" player, having won many games by his basket shooting ability in conjunction with his guarding.

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Simplicity will mark the funeral today here of Walter Camp, famous Yale football mentor, who died in New York Saturday.

Services will be held at his home at 2:25 this afternoon and will be private, only members of the family and a few close friends attending.

The services were conducted by Rev. Roy M. Houghton, pastor of the church of the Redeemer. There will be no honorary pall bearers. Burial will be in Evergreen cemetery.

The body was brought to New Haven Sunday morning.

### Old Time Kitchens Had Their Own Charm

BERLIN (AP) — Kitchens of 1825 were a feature which attracted much attention in Berlin's recent show window competition, designed to show the progress which the last 150 years have brought in home furnishings.

## SALEM TEAM IS CHAMPION OF OREGON

WILLAMETTE UNIVERSITY, Salem, Ore. (Special)—Financially the ninth annual high school basketball tourney which ended here Saturday night was a great success, but one unfortunate incident marred the otherwise excellent meet.

The ten teams were divided into two divisions, five in each group. Unluckily, the drawings placed all except one of the strong teams in the night division. Salem, the silver real contender, drew afternoon games. Eugene, Medford, Franklin of Portland, and Pendleton were placed in the night group.

Salem marched triumphantly through its schedule to the finals, overwhelming Willows, Astoria and McMinnville. Then Salem won from Franklin, victor in the night division, to capture the Willamette trophy and the state title.

Medford fell prey to the Franklin shooters, as did Pendleton. Eugene was conceded an excellent chance against Franklin and barely missed out. Then Franklin played Salem.

Drawing System Criticized. Coaches and followers of several of the quints expressed opinion that it would have been much better to have matched the teams instead of drawing. This would have given the little teams, such as Arago and Willows, a chance to meet quints of their own strength at first, instead of starting against the stronger combinations.

Another topic of discussion was the length of the meet. It was suggested by some coaches that the meet next year be lengthened one day so semi-finals and finals need not be played the same day as was the case Saturday.

The teams in the night division registered most of the dissatisfaction regarding the matching of the teams, Medford in particular expressing itself strongly.

### Substitutes Are Used

The local team, Salem, had little trouble in its games, as it used substitutes freely against the much weaker teams, but Franklin's stamina could endure no longer after its grueling trip through the semi-finals and the Quakers "cracked". Claire Scollon, Franklin's captain, broke down just in the semi-final game and fell to the floor in a faint, yet was forced by the schedule to play again three hours later.

Though defeated for the state title, Franklin took one honor back to Portland, the greatest that can be given any player—the captaincy of the all-state star team. Claire
