Europe Asked to Unite To Protect Wild Birds

STOCKHOLM (AP)—International protection for migratory birds, so that it will be illegal to shoot or trap them in one country while the season is closed in another, has been endorsed by the public lands' department in Sweden. The countries that will be asked to join in this agreement are Great Britain, the Netherlands, Germany, Belgium, Norway, Finland, and Denmark. Without such a treaty there is danger that wild ducks, quail and other edible birds that fly south for the winter will be exterminated.

In these days of artificialities and make believe it is seldom that the theater-goer may be quite certain that scenes passing before him on the motion picture screen are actually those set down by nature, and not cleverly contrived by the genius of the property man. But in the case of "The Mine With the Iron Door," Sol Lesser's film version of Harold Bell Wright's new and popular novel, there is no room for doubt as to the actuality of the scenes and settings.
