LARVAE KILLED BY FROST
BEND, Ore.—Without the aid of man, nature, in the form of Arctic weather, has checked the infestation of western pine beetles in the 25,000 acre tract recently designated in the Metolius district by

the forest service as a beetle control project. This surprising fact, considered most unusual, was ascertained by A. J. Jaenicke, forest service entomologist who completed a survey, intended to be a preliminary to control work on a large scale, Saturday. The survey revealed that at least two-thirds of the beetle larvae in the Metolius area were killed by sub-zero weather last winter.
