## INDO-CHINA MAY BECOME CENTER IN SUGAR WORLD

MANILA (AP) — George H. Fairchild, publisher of the Manila Times, as well as a large producer and exporter of sugar, who recently returned from a three months' visit to Indo-China, Java, Straits Settlement and India, stated that the sugar industry in Indo-China is destined to become of considerable importance in the future.  
 "In Indo-China developments financed by the French government are proceeding and recovery from post-war conditions is practically complete," said Mr. Fairchild. "While sugar cane is growing in many places, there are very few sugar mills in evidence, a large part of the cane being used for eating purposes by the people. During the last two or three years however, two modern sugar concerns have been created. While difficulties have been encountered in trying to induce the people to raise sugar cane for the central mills as the case in the Philippines a few years ago, many are beginning to appreciate the advantage of modern factories and it is believed the pioneering period in Indo-China is destined to become of some importance.

 One of the author's ancestors, Colonel Ebenezer Zane held Fort Henry, now Wheeling, West Virginia, against the Indians for 20 years. Because of his services in withstanding two sieges of the British, Colonel Zane received from General Washington a grant of 10,000 acres. The Colonel founded Wheeling, Martin's Ferry, Zanesville and several other towns.
