No Lives Lost in Fire That Hit Palm Beach

PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP)—With checking of guest lists of the Breakers hotel and the Palm Beach hotel, destroyed by fire Wednesday night, yet incomplete, no loss of life in either hotel has been found. The early estimates of four million dollars were declared too low by Fire Chief Schultz Thursday, when he gave it as his opinion that the total loss, including thousands of dollars in jewelry lost by hotel guests, will reach seven million dollars.

Although the Palm Beach postmaster continued to deny rumors that the post office was robbed of \$20,000 during the fire, authorities were said to be searching for clues that would suggest existence of a plot by which thieves might have started by first that a night in foot might be repaid from wealthy guests. More than a score of prisoners are held by Palm Beach police under charges of looting after the fire.
