PIRATES JOIN IN MOUNTAIN BALL LEAGUE

The first definite steps toward formation of a baseball team were taken today when Harris French, manager of the 1925 Pirate squad commenced rounding up players.

At a meeting of the directors of the club last night it was agreed to enter the Blue Mountain league accepting the rules set forth by the league last Sunday at Pendleton.

The main ruling with which the local club will have to contend at present is the one which allows each team but three salaried players. The other six men on the team must be recruited from among local players.

Along these lines the 60-40 per cent split for the winner and loser of each game becomes of major importance for the reason that both Pendleton and Walla Walla already have teams organized and on the field stronger than the ones they put out last season.

Speedy Work Needed.
So the local club will have to work fast to put a team on the pasture capable of keeping in the money. Manager French has wired and written several available ball players today and the men will be here for trial within a short time.

Meanwhile the local players will have to be rounded up. At the present time to our knowledge only four players from last year's team are about. These are Tex Knight, third base, Bud Theisen, fielder, Spud Helm, shortstop and Rubie Davis who played second base and later field last season.

PORTLAND, Ore. (By the Associated Press)—Phay Heiman, Portland heavyweight, beat Bob Roper of New York in a ten-round fight here last night. It was the best heavyweights bout witnessed in Oregon since the 10 round law went into effect. Heiman made good use of a left hook.

DODGERS HAVE SAME LINEUP

CLEARWATER, Fla. (By the Associated Press)—Wilbert Robinson, manager of the Brooklyn Dodgers, contenders last year to the finish, is conservative in discussing his team's prospects.

"We will start with about the same club that we finished with last fall," he said. J. E. Cox, the outfielder we bought from Portland, bats and fields in a manner to make me believe he will add real strength to the team. My infield, Bourcier at first, High at second and Mitchell at short, and Johnston at third, are working splendidly.

"The only setback has been in minor strains. High and Johnston are nursing these injuries. I will not at this time pass on my new pitchers. I will name neither the best nor the worst. They may reverse themselves and one next week. But I will say that Ehrhardt, the player we obtained from the Cotton States league last fall, is looking fine this spring and I expect to use him as a regular.

"We are handicapped in our exhibition games by the absence of our three star veteran pitchers, Vance, Grimes and Donk. Dazzy has just signed his contract and begun to work out with the club. But he will soon be ready as he came south in mid-winter. Grimes and Donk have not reported yet. They want more money on long contracts."

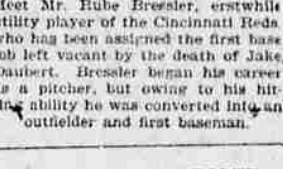
NEWS ITEMS FROM THE CAMPS
