Died — In Union, Tuesday, March 22, 1898, George Horspool, aged 74 years, 2 months and 1 day. The funeral services will be held at the Baptist church of this city, Thursday, March 24, at 10:30 o'clock. Mr. Horspool was one of the pioneers of this valley, having been a constant resident of Union county for the past thirty years, and for many years a prominent business man in La Grande. He has been in ill health for the past year and his many friends have been fearful that the malady from which he was suffering would carry him off for some time. During his illness he has been with his daughter, Mrs. J. T. Richardson, in Union, where loving hands have done all in their power to alleviate his sufferings. The remains will be brought to this city today on the evening train. The interment will take place in the Odd Fellows cemetery.

Havana Slow in Buying Cars. HAVANA (AP)—The total registration of motor driven vehicles in the city of Havana is 17,464. These include 4,402 private automobiles, 8,660 for hire, 1,218 trucks, 454 buses and 123 motorcycles. The number of new cars registered is from three to four a day.

Big Thrill Scenes In "Devil's Cargo" At The Star.

You wouldn't believe it possible to pile so many punch scenes into a picture as are found in Paramount's "The Devil's Cargo," which is the feature at the Star theatre Wednesday.

The story, an adaptation of "The River Boat" by Charles Whittaker, is a fine love melodrama of California in 1850. It opens in the old gold town of Sacramento. Victor Fleming, the director (the movie "Isle of the Sea," "Empty Hands" and others), took his cast and crew of more than two hundred men and women down to the Sacramento river for a month's stay. Here they built a replica of the old pioneer town and relived the lives of its people.

"The Devil's Cargo" is an accurate, graphic picture of the thrill-filled days of the dim and distant past—the days of the great open spaces where men were men. And there's one particularly hateful character in the picture—Wallace Berry—lie of "Robin Hood" and "The Sea Hawk." Berry, it is claimed, has the finest role of his career as the big brute stoker of the river boat, on which the vigilantes, a band of law-abiding citizens of Sacramento, deport the town's undesirable.

In the picture you see one of the greatest free-for-all of your life between Berry and William Collier, Jr. Both are featured in the production with Pauline Starke and Claire Adams.
