CHINA, RUSSIA DISPUTE TITLE
PEKING (AP)—The ownership of 20,000,000 gold rubles worth of rolling stock, bought and paid for by the British government for use on the Russian railway during the World War, which is still on the tracks of the Chinese Eastern railway, is being claimed both by the Soviet and Chinese authorities.

FINLAND'S BUYING POWER
HELSINGFORS, Finland (AP)—The unusually mild winter weather which has been experienced for the last few months throughout all the Baltic states, has had far-reaching effects in Finland, especially on the timber trade, which has been seriously hampered. Widespread unemployment has brought diminution in the purchasing power of a large proportion of the people, and a reduction in the market for commodities.

CHINESE GIVE WARSAW SCARE

WARSAW, Poland (AP)—Fearing a so-called Chinese invasion because of the visits to this country of nearly 1,000 orientals during the last few months, the Polish government has decided that no more Chinese will be admitted until their applications have been passed upon by the Warsaw foreign office. The Chinese government, it is understood, is awaiting further details of the Polish government's action before taking up the question with the Warsaw officials.

124 locomotives have been in operation on the Chinese Eastern for the past five years. About 3,000 American cars, like the locomotives, were held back in 1920. A certain number were taken by the Bolsheviks, but the majority for 1924 shows that the railway still has about 2,500 of them. The total value of this rolling stock is nearly 70,000,000 gold rubles.

LOS ANGELES (AP)—The near beer Carl Eitzer bought in a Hollywood grocery as a "harmless, wholesome and healthful" drink contained so much fusel oil that he was thrown into convulsions and nearly killed by partaking of it. He is alleged to be a \$20,000 damage suit on file in superior court Friday against the brewing company that manufactured the beverage. He admits that the beer was non-intoxicating.
