The stock, as of 1913, was one of the material considerations entering into the sale. It was a very definite, perhaps even a determining factor, in the sale. Had the government then fixed the figure Secretary Mellon now suggests would have been proper, Couzens' net return would have been some \$10,000,000 less. It seems quite likely the sale never would have been made at that figure.

If the government is now able to establish and enforce a lower 1913 valuation as a basis for taxing the profits on the sale to Ford, it is claimed the validity of the whole transaction could be set aside and Couzens reinstated in the ownership of his Ford stock, should he so desire. For the valuation previously fixed by the very definite and valuable consideration and formed a basic part of the agreement on which the sale was concluded. In event this contention was upheld in the courts, the government instead of collecting additional taxes from Couzens would have to refund taxes heretofore collected on the sale. And Henry Ford would have to make an accounting to Couzens on profits made during the last half dozen years. Which would bring Ford into the fight and insure litigation lasting years beyond the span of the present administration.

Vassar Reports Radical Changes in Last Decade
 Ten years have wrought vast changes in the characteristics of Vassar college students, chiefly prepared by the college officials. In 1910 a total of 25 per cent of the students prepared for Vassar in public high schools and only 42 per cent in private schools. By 1920 the public schools were furnishing 55 per cent.
 Registration lists in 1916 were closed two and a half years before entrance. Students entering in the classes of 1925 were registered four and a half years in advance. Quite an extreme change was found in subjects required for entrance. In 1915 entering students were examined only in algebra, Latin and French. In 1920 five subjects were required and 12 were on the alternative or elective lists.

Tiny Mice Given Homes in London's Noted Zoo
 LONDON (AP)—The smallest animals at the London Zoo are a family of tiny mice, which arrived recently from Gambia, in western Africa. They are smaller than hamster mice, and a pair could easily set up housekeeping in an ordinary safety match box. While the pigmies were being shipped to London 15 of them escaped through a hole smaller than might be made by a state pencil, and none of them was ever seen again.
