The Garden

Preparing Soil for Forcing

Both for sowing indoors in boxes and outdoors in cold frames and hotbeds the greatest care should be used in the preparation of the soil.

The seed sowing surface should be fine and provided with good drainage underneath. Right soil is needed to give the tiny plants a flying start.

The sifted earth should be mixed with some of the pulverized commercial fertilizers, in the proportions which are given with the fertilizer when it is sold.

Break up the lumps in the soil and sift it. Spread it evenly over the surface of the foundation soil and make it level and firm before sowing the seed.

Much trouble and uneven germination and loss of young plants will follow an uneven surface, as the moisture will drain off the higher portions and collect in the hollows.

Germination will be quicker in the moist portions and when germination has resulted there will be the danger of damping off in these too-moist places while the higher levels are likely to dry out.

An even surface is necessary for an even distribution of moisture.

The surface should be well moistened a short time before the seed is sown. After the seed has been sown it is a wise plan to cover the surface of the soil with paper, cloths or burlap until germination starts.

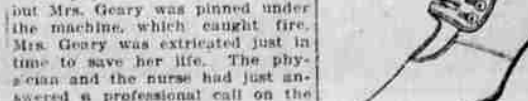
It will be necessary to keep close watch to remove the coverings as soon as the first white sprouts appear through the ground.

Once the plants are up the problem of watering is one to be studied. Do not deluge the frames or seed pans as the seeds and little plants will be washed to their destruction.

Water with a spray or sprinkle by dipping a whisk brook in the watering can and sprinkling gently so the water will fall upon the seed surface like a gentle rain.

Pouring water upon a seed bed from the nose of an ordinary sprinkling can will do more harm than good except to the coarsest seeds.

Wynne Ferguson Author of Ferguson on Auction Bridge gives you these EASY LESSONS IN AUCTION BRIDGE

In the preceding article the writer referred to two questions from a correspondent, a discussion of which would, interest all auction players and in that article took up the first question. The second question is as follows:

"First hand has bid no-trump, second has passed, third has over-called his partner with two hearts, and fourth has bid two spades. Under what conditions should the original hand (a) bid two no-trumps; (b) raise his partner to three hearts?"

This particular question opens up a very wide field of discussion and one that can be handled only in a very general way. For the purpose of this discussion it will be assumed that neither side has a score. Also assume that the dealer has bid one no-trump with each of the following hands:

Hearts—Q, 7, 2 Clubs—A, 10, 4, 2 Diamonds—K, 10, 9, 8 Spades—K, J, 7

Hearts—Q, 10, 7, 2 Clubs—A, 10, 4, 2 Diamonds—K, Q, 9, 8 Spades—Q, 7, 2

Hearts—7, 2 Clubs—A, 10, 4, 2 Diamonds—K, Q, 9, 8 Spades—Q, 7, 2

Hearts—7, 4 Clubs—A, K, Q, 7, 6, 3 Diamonds—K, 10, 7 Spades—K, 7

Then assume that his partner has bid two hearts and fourth hand has bid two spades. With Hand A, the dealer should bid no-trump. He has a double stopper in the spade suit and only two hearts. For that reason the suit bid on three hearts if you no-trump bid, offers the better chance for game. If his partner has a strong heart suit, it is up to him to bid three hearts.

The bid of two no-trumps indicates a strong hand but no particular help for the heart bid. Also he bids to help your partner's suit bid with only two trumps or less. The only exception to this is when you hold ace or king and one other.

In hand B, the dealer should undoubtedly bid three hearts. He has no stopper in the spade suit and yet very strong help for his partner's heart bid. This hand is a fine example of the type of hand on which to assist partner's suit bid.

In hand C, the dealer should pass. He has only one stopper in spades and less than normal help for his partner's heart suit. For that reason, he should neither bid two no-trump nor three hearts. It is a fine example of a hand that is just under the requirements for a two no-trump bid.

In hand D, the dealer should bid two no-trump. He has only one stopper in the spade suit but he set up club suit make the hand a good chance for game in no-trump. The fact that it contains only two small hearts makes a three heart bid inadvisable. It is a fine example of a hand that is just over the requirements for a two no-trump bid.

It is manifestly impossible to include in this discussion all of the various types of hands that might come under the conditions specified in the question, but the foregoing examples are typical and will act as a guide in the great majority of instances. As a general rule, bid two no-trump if you have a double stopper in the two hearts. For that reason the suit bid on three hearts if you no-trump bid, offers the better chance for game. If his partner has a strong heart suit, it is up to him to bid three hearts.
