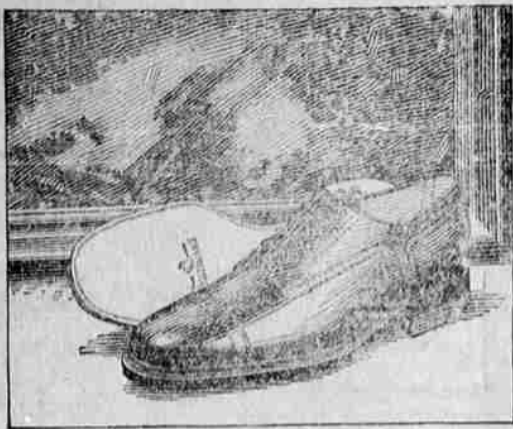

## GIRL'S TRIAL JURY CHOSEN

SAN FRANCISCO (AP Press Time Flash)—Dorothy Ellingson's trial for murder of her mother may be halted by a plea today of some degree of guilt made direct to Judge Loderback. The girl's counsel said he would confer with the judge in an effort to agree on a plea acceptable to all concerned. The defense has expressed a willingness to have the girl plead guilty to manslaughter.

SAN FRANCISCO (City Assn. Associated Press)—After five days of patient effort, a jury had been completed Friday evening to decide the fate of 16-year-old Dorothy Ellingson, the world-wide child of jazz, charged with the murder of her mother, who was shot fatally in the bedroom of their home here last January, after a quarrel over the girl's conduct.

With the selection of the jury and two alternates, Judge Harold Loderback adjourned court until Monday morning, when opening statements will be made and evidence presented.

The jury finally sworn in after momentous days of questioning, challenging and excluding contains nine men and three women. Both of the alternates are women.

**Makeup of Jury.**  
Most of the men and women are of middle age or elderly. One of the men, a salesman, married and the father of a young child, is youthful in appearance. The women on the jury are mothers. One of them has two girls and a boy; the other two young sons. Among the male jurors are a retired grocer, a motor transport superintendent, two contractors, a painter, a book seller, a clerk, a carpenter, a retired stockbroker. Several are the fathers of grown children.

The young girl at the bar of justice faintly twice Friday as on previous days, after adjournment had been taken for recesses. She seemed to fight for composure during the court session, and not once did she interrupt one of them. At the afternoon recess, as she started out unceremoniously, bearing on her pale cheeks, she murmured "oh dear me," and slumped down.

She was carried out and revived. She appeared in court about 29 minutes later and sat less nervously than the rest of the afternoon.

When court had closed for the day she smiled as she chatted with the matron on her way back to jail.

Attorneys on both sides denied that there is any basis for the report published here Friday to the effect that a plea of guilty to some degree of crime might suddenly end the trial. Counsel said they were preparing to go ahead with the case and anticipated no compromise.

## Rocky Mountain Fever May Yield to Vaccine

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The State Board of Health reports that outlook is encouraging for the production of a vaccine to make people immune from Rocky Mountain fever, a dreaded disease in the plateau regions of the Far West.

The board quotes this report from Mountain: The research laboratory of the United States public health service at Hamilton is doing valuable work in its attempt to solve the whole Rocky Mountain spotted fever problem. Drs. Spencer and Barker have devoted their best effort to the production of an immunizing vaccine. At the present time the outlook is most encouraging. Dr. Spencer, with the courage of his convictions, administered to himself the first dose of this vaccine ever administered to a human. A recent report from the doctor indicates that he has been able to immunize guinea pigs with his own blood serum. This would tend to show that the doctor has succeeded in producing a vaccine of very great value.

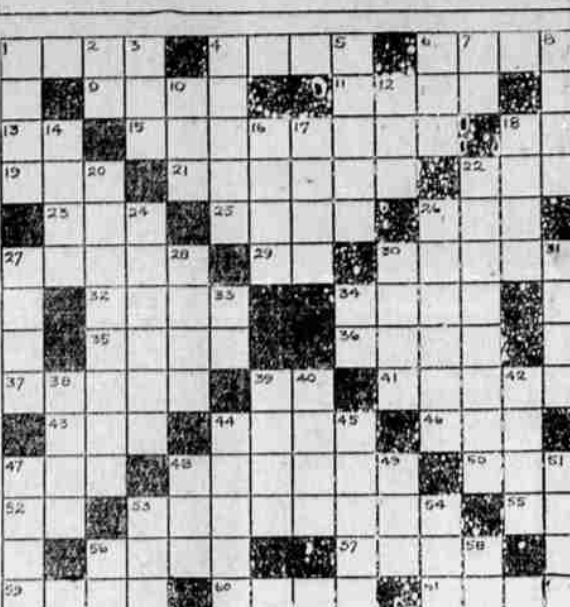
## N. Y. SUPER CLUBS CLOSE

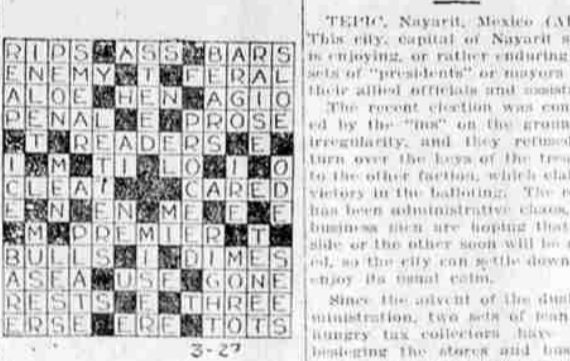
## Observer Crossword Puzzle

## BONNEVILLE IN WALLOWA IN '34

WALLOWA, Ore. (Special to the Observer)—An effort is being made to trace the route of Captain Bonneville, who evidently passed through the Wallowa valley in the winter of 1824, states an account in a local newspaper.

Bonneville's diary was purchased by Washington Irving, the first great American writer, for a thousand dollars and was made into an interesting volume called "Captain Bonneville." Now J. Neilson Barry, working for the Trail Riders' association, is attempting from the evidence in the diary to determine the path taken by the famous explorer, who later became a legendary general.

Captain Bonneville left Wallowa, Wash., in 1824, and probably crossed the Tule Mountains at the Toll Gate pass, or at the head of Walla Walla river and Little Salmon river. He speaks of proceeding down the Snake river valley. Where he crossed the mountains is a problem. Mr. Barry thinks it was made into Eagle creek but this would have been almost impossible to do. Barry's predecessor, who was consulted on the matter, is of the opinion that the crossing was made at an old Indian trail on the upper boundary, five miles above the Cascade Range station. 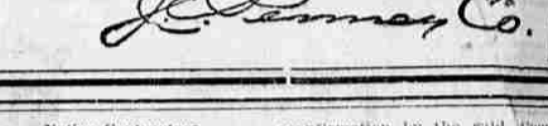

## Fog Exterminators Sought by British

LONDON, (AP)—The latest effort of science to rid London of its annoying fogs by means of suction fans has been a failure. The fans were attached to a condenser box, which received the dirt-laden fog and, by means of heat, reduced it to ordinary atmosphere, which was allowed to escape into the air and die. The suction fans varied from three to 15 inches in diameter and were powerful enough to handle several cubic feet of fog a minute.

The inventors took advantage of the several dense fogs during the winter to test their exterminator, but they have now admitted its impracticability because it would take, they say, at least 750 condensers working together materially to affect even a light fog.

The condensers would have to be placed in the streets, on roofs and poles throughout the city, and such installations would cost about \$25,000,000.

The London County Council is attempting to argue interest among inventors to produce a fog exterminator, and has offered to finance testing arrangements. The offer of a prize for a successful machine several years ago brought many inventions from Germany and Austria, but they all failed to affect the thick mist which wanders into the Thames valley in winter.
