**GIBBONS SEEKS BATTLE**  
CHICAGO (AP)—Eddie Kane, manager of Tommy Gibbons, left Sunday night for New York to close a match with either Gene Tunney, light heavyweight champion, or with Harry Wills, negro challenger, for Jack Dempsey's heavyweight crown, the match to be decided in New York within the next three months. Unless something unexpected should happen, Kane expects to sign for the contest not later than Tuesday.

The manager of the St. Paul heavyweight was accompanied by Emory DeForrest, matchmaker for the Polo A. C., New York, who is bidding for a match between Gibbons and Tunney. DeForrest spent two days in St. Paul conferring with Billy Gibson, manager of Tunney, and also with Gibbons.

**'RED' CHAPMAN TO CLAIM FEATHERWEIGHT TITLE**

BOSTON (AP)—Charlie Cardo, manager of "Red" Chapman of Chelsea, a featherweight who recently defeated Johnny Dundee in Boston, has announced that Chapman would claim the world's featherweight championship. His claim is based on the claim that Dundee, who laid down the featherweight mantle several months ago, again is in competition and would remain champion until actually defeated by a boxer in the class. Kid Kaplan of Meriden, Conn., has announced that he is competing for the title in a recent tournament in New York, has been generally recognized as featherweight champion.

"Chapman was within the limit of the featherweight class at the official weighing-in time and so in defeating Dundee, he took over Dundee's claims to the title," Cardo said. "State boxing commissions cannot make world champions, and Dundee, because he is still in competition, remained champion until he lost to Chapman Monday night. Now Chapman will claim the title because he has earned it."

**DE PALMA WINS 2 RACES**

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP)—Ralph De Palma won the mile and five-mile automobile races on the state fair track here Sunday, setting a new track record of 44.1-5 seconds in the mile event. His time in the five-mile race was 3:53 2-5. Frank Lockhart and Eddie Hearne finished second and third, respectively, in De Palma in both races.

**ATHLETIC GRIP IS DEPLOYED**

NEW YORK (AP)—Domination by athletics of the intellectual life of American colleges and universities was deplored by Dr. Henry R. Fletcher, president of the Carnegie foundation for the advancement of teaching in his annual report, made public Sunday.

Dr. Fletcher expressed hope for educational development in this country. "Whatever may be the weakness in our American system of education," he said, "there is always ground for the belief that our people will find their way to a system of schools that will make for good citizenship and that will promote a high quality of human life."

Discussing college athletics, he said: "Today the outside activities of the college overshadow and run counter to the intellectual life. Athletics, in a large measure, professional in its methods and organization, fill a large place in the eyes of students and even of the public than any other interest."

"No reasonable man will object to the employment of these activities, for example, athletics in their due perspective. But when they are allowed to dominate the intellectual life of the colleges they become abominable."

"The paid coaches, the professional organization of college athletics, and the demoralization of students by participation in the use of extravagant sums of money constitute a reproach to American colleges and to those who govern them."

The first round of the tourney starts Tuesday noon and games will continue until Saturday evening, when the finals will be played.
