OAKLAND, Cal. (AP)—In the early days of California Don Antonio Higuera was one of the wealthiest ranchers in the state. He held the Warm Springs grant of thousands of acres, and large herds of cattle. In the heyday of their prosperity Higuera and his wife, Clara, planned to be buried together in the ancient Mission San Jose cemetery. An expensive vault was built, an elaborate monument erected.

Sister Higuera died and the monument was carved with the date of his death, July 24, 1853. The name of his widow was also inscribed, with the date left blank.

Clara Higuera died long ago, but lies in a nameless grave, no one knows where. Father John A. Leal, priest of Mission San Jose, has been informed. In her old age reverses left her penniless and she became a public ward, somewhere, and a potter's field finally claimed her. Her costly vault waits in vain.

HIGH-PRICED NOVELS FIND FEW BUYERS IN ENGLAND

LONDON (AP)—A problem just now facing publishers in this country is the evident disinclination on the part of the reading public to pay 7 shillings and 6 pence (\$1.35 for novels, 12 shillings and 6 pence (\$2.10) for memoirs and higher prices for classical literature. It is suggested that books will circulate through libraries more quickly enough, but when it comes to outright purchasing the public is shy and wants something cheaper. An instance of this is given in the number of paper-bound novels and magazines which travelers buy when on a railway journey.

A possible way out of the difficulty, according to the representative of one publishing house, is to bind books in paper covers. The

present binding costs nearly as much as did the whole book in paper days.
