SOCIALISTS IN BIG CAMPAIGN

BRUSSELS (AP)—The Socialists are the most active and present a more united front than either the Conservatives or the Liberals in the intensive political campaign now under way in preparation for the Belgian elections April 5.

For the great political parties during the entire representation of the last chamber the Socialists were the first to get their electing going full blast, and there are many political observers who believe that unless the Conservatives, under Premier Theunis, and the Liberals, headed by M. Hymans, get together on a common platform, the left group has a splendid opportunity of coming back with a clear majority.

The Socialists are especially strong in the Ghent cotton mill district, where the party now owns some ten mills, both spinning and weaving, have their own commission purchasing houses for raw material and own their own private bank. The so-called bourgeois and capitalist parties are here less than making many caustic comments to the effect that the Socialist party is the greatest capitalist in Ghent.

The Activists, who came into prominence during the German occupation through their dealings with German Governor General Von Bismarck and Von Falkenberg, are conducting a very bitter campaign, calling for the complete separation of Flanders from Wallonia.

Pacific Traders To Talk Business in Seattle, Wash.

NEW YORK, (AP)—American business bonds with the Orient, where American foreign trade has increased by 400 percent since 1912, will be further strengthened this year by the coming of delegations from six foreign nations bordering on the Pacific to the Twelfth National Foreign Trade Convention, which will be held at Seattle, Washington, June 24, 25 and 26, according to an announcement given out by the National Foreign Trade Council, founded in 1914. The council is now to hold the first of its yearly conventions in the Pacific northwest.

Delegates to the convention, including the representatives of the six Pacific countries, China, Japan, India, Straits Settlements, Dutch East India and the Philippines, will be invited to view the site of this remarkable growth at first hand and will be taken on tour to other cities of the Pacific northwest, particularly Portland, Tacoma and Spokane, as guests of the local chamber of commerce.

WEALTH DRIVES MODEST VETERAN TO THE SOUTH EL DOLADO, Ark. (AP)—Oil, the liquid gold of fiction, is a fugitive among minerals and more often than not eludes man, but not "Uncle Nap" Brown. "Uncle Nap" is the fugitive. Twice oil has overwhelmed him with added riches and now he has what he hopes is a haven, a farm in Texas, where oil has not been struck, yet.
