The room in which the boys were confined has a large window opening on the north side of the court house toward the Sacred Heart Academy. Bars across the window were fastened on by means of bolts.

It is thought by the police that some accomplice traced or handed a key to the boys in the cell and with the key unlocked the bars off of the window and a comparatively simple task. The drop to the ground was effected by means of a small porch at the rear of the court house.

The officers questioned other members of the gang of boys known to be friendly to the two who escaped but were unable to find any who could not furnish a clue.

Indians Will Lease Lands

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore.—Certain areas of the tribal range land in the Klamath Indian reservation closed to white livestock men for cattle grazing purposes were reopened by an act of the tribal council of the reservation.

Fred A. Taylor, superintendent, announced the grazing land which is now available to whites for leasing is land which would not be used by Klamath Indians this year, it was announced.

Feminists of Italy Fighting For Votes Reminded of Borgias

ROME (AP).—Angered by the suspicion that they have been the victims of a political game and indignat at the idea that the government has openly broken its promise to grant women suffrage in municipal elections, Italian proponents of equal political rights for men and women have begun a new and vigorous campaign to win public opinion to their side of the case and to make the government change its stand.

The decision of committees of the senate and chamber of deputies rejecting woman's suffrage as a step too important to be taken at this time, was a particularly bitter one for the suffragists because it came but a short time after their hopes had been raised, as they had been never before, by the declaration of Premier Mussolini before a congress of women from all parts of the globe that Italy intended to grant the vote to its women.

Government leaders explain their change of front as a necessary result of the present political situation, but the women refuse to believe this especially since one government spokesman was quoted as saying: "Italy has suffered too much in the past from women rulers; it is not easy to forget the Borgias."

The National association of Italian Women has issued a manifesto declaring that 45 nations have granted the vote to women and that Italy runs the risk of being the last to take this step, thereby creating false ideas abroad about social and political conditions south of the Alps.

Senators and deputies are being besieged by women visitors and their mail boxes flooded with letters. The newspapers are receiving scores of letters, many of them enumerating important Italian women to answer the assertion that Italy has suffered by the misdeeds of its women.

FORM OUTPOSTS

DULUTH, Minn.—Formation of "outposts" of the American Legion is the innovation in legion organization recently authorized by the executive committee of David Wistard post of the legion here. The plan is to establish "outposts" or branches of the larger posts in the smaller outlying communities.

A vice commander will be in charge of each outpost. He will also be a member of the parent post executive committee.

HOOD RIVER, Ore.—Because of the incompleteness of the accommodations at the snow line area, Dorsey R. Smith, head of a Portland tourist agency, in an address to the Tuesday lunch club here, announced that tourists will not be encouraged in making the Mount Hood loop highway trip this season.

HERO PASSES AWAY

HOLLYWOOD, Cal.—Fearless Sam Dreben, characterized by General Pershing as the "finest soldier and one of the bravest men I ever knew," was buried by his comrades of Hollywood post of the American Legion here. Dreben died here of paralysis after an illness of several months, aged 47. Dreben was known internationally for his daredevilries on a score of battle fields; American world war hero and soldier of fortune in a dozen revolutions; filibuster with Villa and as a personal friend of Pershing. The United States awarded him the distinguished service cross; France decorated him with the croix de guerre and Italy also honored him.

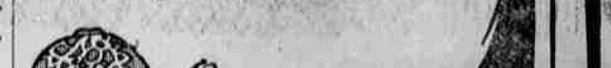
