An ordinance was read for the second time providing for the vacation of the alley in Block 76.

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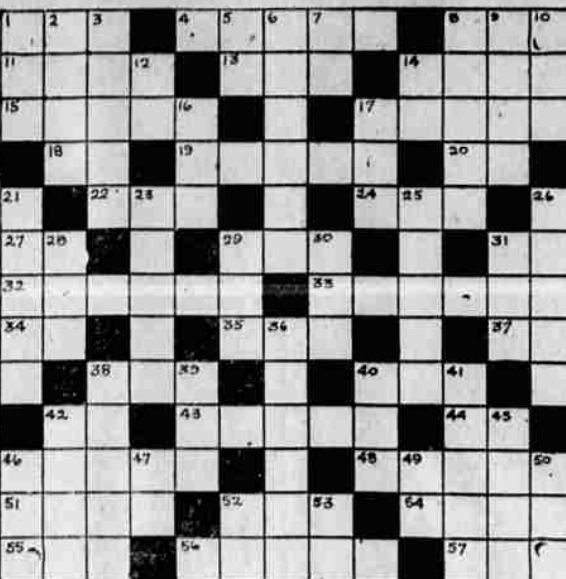
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Observer Crossword Puzzle
