LIQUOR STATUTE STRICT

SALEM, Ore.—Provisions of the statute revoking the license of a person guilty of driving an automobile while under the influence of liquor are clearly mandatory, and the license can only be restored by issuing a pardon, Attorney General Van Winkle has advised Governor Pierce, who sought a method to restore the license of Paul Shallenberger, Portland manufacturer, the first man sentenced under the new state law.

"The only thing you could do would be to issue a complete pardon and you will pardon me if I suggest that I do not see how you could do this and expect the law to be observed and enforced," the opinion reads.

Governor Pierce is absent from Salem, speaking on law enforcement in eastern Oregon.

WALLOWA'S FUTURE IS NOT GLOOMY

(Continued from Page One.) care of many times its present population without crowding anyone.

Much Land Undeveloped Aside from the region around Wallowa lake, rugged and sure to be set aside as a scenic attraction for the entire world to view, much land remains undeveloped — some

that will sometime be fully claimed for agriculture. The annual rainfall is about 20 inches and the altitude ranges from 2700 to 4250 feet above sea level. The climate is affected by the mountains to a great extent—the summers are beautiful and the winters are cold. The season for agriculture although slightly shorter than in lower regions, is long enough to successfully grow and harvest grains, hay, and other similar crops.

There is practically no government land open to homestead entry now, but a good deal of the land proved on will, in the future, produce much more than at present.

The chief products of the valley, from an agricultural standpoint, are: butterfat, hogs, cattle, sheep, wool and grain. The dairying industry is gaining a strong foothold throughout the county. Silos dot the valley and much hay and fodder are raised.

Wheat, barley and oats are the chief grains grown. Sunflowers, alfalfa, clover, timothy and field peas are other important crops. These are all grown on dry farm land.

Large Ranges The livestock industry is one of the most important—sheep, cattle, hogs and horses being raised. Large ranging territories assure plenty of summer feed, in fact, many stockmen from outside points graze their animals in Wallowa county during the warmer months.

Incidentally, Wallowa county boasts of being the hamper log county in Oregon. And she has some strong reasons for the title too. Some of the finest types of porkers raised anywhere are to be seen.

Land Values According to information furnished by the Enterprise chamber of commerce, land values in the county follow: Irrigated, \$1,000 acres, \$70 to \$100 per acre; range and dry farming, 670,000 acres, \$5 to \$30. Water rights perpetual, annual cost 50 cents to \$2 per acre.

In the future, farming is bound to increase in value to the county. Better facilities for exporting products would boost the agriculture to some extent and with the dairy business growing at its present rate, much can be expected from this branch.

Fruit raising and truck gardening of all kinds for home use are grown.
