## DEATHS FEW IN WALLOWA

(Continued from Page One.)  
 as predominate to an amazing extent. The male population of the county undoubtedly is much larger than the female, with the many young men on farms and in camps and this can account for the excess of males in the death rate, but it does not explain the excess in the births.

In most countries where the birth rate is high, the death rate also is excessive because children and mothers do not have proper care. The excess of births over deaths in Wallowa county for the three years is 254, or nearly 115 per year, which gives a gain of nearly 13 a thousand a year, which is greater than the rate of growth of population of the nation, including immigration.

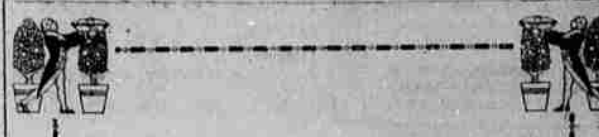
